VICTORIA

In Vancouver, we always kick off the Christmas season with our 'Women's Christmas Breakfast'. All women are invited from near and far, members, relatives and friends.





Under the direction of their Sunday School teacher, Karen Ell, the preschool class performed two recitations about the Christmas story.




RIBSTONE
