MY EXPERIENCE WITH FUNDRAISING




Get God

Through the Get God program, a leadership training program for young adults in the Canada West Mission Centre, I have been working on a fundraising project to raise money for improvements to the Victoria church. For the fundraiser I organized a book drive. I have learned a lot through this experience. It has taught me that sometimes generosity comes from surprising places. I have also learned the importance of asking for help, and that there are various ways to measure success.


Naturally, before we could sell books, we had to collect a lot of book donations. Congregation members asked their neighbours for donations, and took boxes to their buildings and community centres. Some of my family members were able to take donation boxes to their places of employment, and so was I.

The next step in collecting a large number of books was to call local



businesses, especially those in the surrounding neighbourhood. I naively thought this would be easy. They all knew the church was there, why wouldn't they let us put a donation box in their stores or staff rooms? I was shocked by how many said no! I was not aware that so many companies have such strict policies regarding any kind of outside fundraising. I thought it wouldn't be an issue because I was asking for books, not money. Everyone was polite, but they had no choice but to stick to their company policies.


I admit that I got discouraged. I tried to remain positive, but I was concerned about getting enough donations. As it turned out, I didn't need to worry. A few weeks later, I was suddenly getting responses to



my social media posts, asking if I was still looking for books. A friend called because she had 5 boxes of books left over from a book drive her company had done, and she was happy to donate them to my book drive rather than see them go to recycling. Also the community centre near the church was regularly requiring their donation box to be emptied.

I personally don't drive but other congregation members and my step father were kind enough to pick up books. Debra Donohue even picked up books donated at the Vancouver congregation and brought them over to Victoria when she came to visit.

When it came time for our big book sale, we decided it would be best to set up the night before. I knew that I would need help setting up tables, sorting all the books and then pricing them. I am generally not comfortable asking for help, but I knew that I would never get everything done on my own. Luckily for me, Victoria congregation is always ready to help out. In fact, I don't think anyone asked IF I needed help, just what I needed done. Between family, friends, and church members I had almost too many helpers. And you know what? It was way more fun than it ever would have been if I had tried to just do it myself.



The day of the event I would have loved to see all of Victoria swarm to our church and buy up all the books! Although that didn't happen, we did get a fair amount of people and raised \$157.00, which is pretty good considering most of the books were \$1-\$3. The event was successful in another way as well. Most of our customers were people that had never been to the church before. We had opportunity to connect with members of the community, some of whom had previously not known we were there. In May we will be having a garage sale at the church. I'm interested and excited to meet more people in the community, and to see how many returning people we will be able to reconnect with.

The Get God program continues to challenge me to reach outside my comfort zone and experience things differently. Fundraising was initially full of obstacles, but finding a way around the obstacles is part of the challenge. As I go forward with this program, I know that I will continue to have opportunity to meet new people, but also opportunity to connect more with my own congregation.

As it says in the mission prayer: "God, where will your Spirit lead today?" I can't wait to find out!



She looked at me, paused for a moment and told me not to wish for time to pass quickly, because each year of my life would go by faster than the last, and it wouldn't be long before I was wishing for just the opposite, for the days to move slower. She was a little sad and thoughtful and seemed genuinely concerned that I understand the point she was making. She passed away in 1983.

IT STARTED WITH A CONVERSATION

It started with a conversation between a young adult and "no longer a" young adult and it became a vision for so much more.

Last fall I wrote about the Young Adult Dialogue Project through which Rachelle Smalldon was guiding our young adults in conversation and discernment about their future involvement with Community of Christ. On April 16, thirty-eight young adults and congregational leaders from Vancouver to Winnipeg gathered in Edmonton to share in a discussion about the young adult's journey and what the future of Community of Christ can hold for everyone.

The young adults shared what they learned about themselves, what was important to them in Community of Christ and their role in creating a sustainable future for Community of Christ.

This is what I learned ...

Community of Christ is important to everyone

Our young adults want future generations to have the same experience they had growing up

The congregation leaders and young adults are not so divided, we share many of the same concerns, hopes and dreams

- Our young adults want to be involved in their local congregations but are looking for mentorship, guidance and the opportunity to be engaged
- They believe Community of Christ is radically different and the world needs to learn about who we are and the mission of Jesus Christ

Young Adults are looking for meaningful ways to truly live in community and represent Christ in their daily encounters

Sunday morning worship doesn't always "do it" and they want to explore "church without walls"

In the afternoon, participants met in local small groups (*e.g., all attendees from Saskatchewan were a small group*) where we discussed our visions and plans for the future. At the end of the small group meetings, participants gathered together to begin creating a collective goal for everyone to work toward in their local areas. The following information provided by Rachelle Smalldon is what we accomplished:

We proclaim Jesus Christ and promote communities of Joy, Hope, Love and Peace. The world is calling us - in our faith communities - to be significant, inclusive and relevant in our relationships.

After determining our collective goal, we discussed what steps were needed to help us move closer to a common vision:

We identified 3 key things which need to happen in order to move [us] closer to our vision:

We need to let our community know who/where/what we are and do something they care about.

Step outside and meet our neighbours.

We will get to know the needs of our community as we become more involved in those communities.

<u>We decided we will know we've got it when:</u> We are a better reflection of the communities or neighbourhoods we belong to (e.g., socio-economic and multi-cultural communities, LGBT community).

We then identified 3 key plans/goals each local area can realistically achieve in the next year:

Within the next year, in our local area, we will move closer to our collective vision by:

Continuing to support our charities/causes and be more intentional about sharing what we're doing (ie. Welcoming Community Network, Food Bank, etc.)

Trying at least one new idea (ie. "football church" or take on a new community/charity/cause.

And in all of these ... be intentional about having young adult inclusion, leadership and support in these activities. Support causes and try new ideas.

I felt encouraged as I realized both leaders and young adults have many of the same goals and there is a willingness to work together to meet those common goals. I encourage you to engage in continuing conversation as to how we can truly be Community of Christ.

In closing, I want to share Rachelle's words of encouragement: "... Feel proud of the steps you have taken toward making your local and larger community an even better reflection of what you feel the world is calling you, an intergenerational community, to become. ... Take these conversations, visions and plans seriously and consider how you can make a bit

There is no time or room to write about details. Here is a summary of my calendar from the first four months of the year:

- February: Saturday, 21st: meet with Saskatoon leadership; Sunday, 22nd: speak at Sunday service; Saturday, 27th: meet with Prince Albert members in evening, Sunday, 28th: speak Sunday morning in Prince Albert, then visit with Paddockwood members Sunday afternoon: Monday morning, 29th: visit with Porcupine Plain members
- March: Thursday to Saturday, 10th to 12th: Canadian church leadership meetings in Guelph, Ontario; Friday to Sunday, 18th to 20th: Encounter World Religions Weekend in Vancouver
- April: 2nd to 8th, Saturday to Thursday: travel with Apostle Art Smith and Bishop of Canada Dar Shepherdson to Lethbridge, Calgary, Chilliwack, and Meadow Ridge congregations, plus visits to members in Salmon Arm, Kelowna, and Prince George (Art & Dar continued to Victoria and Vancouver without me); Saturday, 9th: Preside at Calgary Congregation Business Meeting; Sunday, 10th speak at Ribstone; Friday to Sunday, 15th to 17th: CWM Pastors and Young Adults Retreat in Edmonton.

Whew! That's visits to 12 of 15 congregations in CWM since New Year's – and two visits or more to some of them! As you will perceive there is an overt purpose to each of the visits – meeting, speaking, consulting, guiding, or presiding. There is always an underlying purpose: visiting, listening, understanding, serving, supporting, and ministering. There is nothing more important in my travelling through the mission centre than meeting members and friends in our congregations and trying my best to understand the issues and concerns (both personally and about the church) that are of most significance to them. I have felt welcomed everywhere I have gone. I thank you for the privilege of visiting with you in your congregations and in your homes. You are truly a blessing to me in ways I cannot describe here.

There are stories and lessons that could be shared from various parts of those first four months of the year. 2016 WORLD CONFERENCE: THE CHASM AND BRIDGE TO ATTAWAPISKAT

World Conference is always an exciting, dynamic Spirit-filled time! On the other hand, Attawapiskat – a remote First Nations community near James Bay – has experienced 100 suicide attempts in the previous six months in a community of 2000. Such a chasm – hope, joy, peace and love contrasted with such overwhelming pain and despair.

But this World Conference also contains a potential bridge to such situations as Attawapiskat. One of the resolutions is "G-7 Supporting Indigenous Peoples".

Firstly it calls for the church to renounce the **Doctrine of Discovery**. This doctrine dates back to the mid-1400s and, in essence, stated that when the European explorers found a "new land" they could claim it for their monarch, meaning that the indigenous people had no rights to the land (Thomas Jefferson extended it to the U.S.; in Canada it was an assumed British legacy).



The issue? It was an <u>officially sanctioned **Christian** doctrine</u> and was used to justify the ensuing massacres, dislocations and genocidal dynamics during that period of conquest and colonization (the few dissenting voices back then were ignored).

Worse – I didn't know that even in **2005** the Doctrine of Discovery was an underlying influence in a US Supreme Court decision (City of Sherrill, NY v. Oneida Nation).

So while I had nothing to do with creating the Doctrine of Discovery, it has helped give me a dominant place in the world, and continues subtly to have its influence. I hope World Conference will heed the counsel to "Courageously challenge cultural, political, and religious trends that are contrary to the reconciling and restoring purposes of God." [DC 164:3b].

Renouncing the Doctrine of Discovery will not solve Attawapiskat but we all need to decide whether it is a step in the right direction (and thus might create a pylon for a bridge) or is somehow wrong-headed.

Similarly **G-7** urges governments to comply with the **UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples**. The Declaration outlines steps and affirmations that might help indigenous people throughout the world find their due place in the modern world. It is a complex though non-binding document, trying to balance the notion of State sovereignty with the rights of indigenous peoples to self-determination and governance, etc.

The Declaration upholds basic human rights and then gets into issues of the harmful legacy of history and how to rectify it; issues of language and cultural preservation; issues of education and livelihood; and issues of land tenure and resources. It states that is should be interpreted according to "principles of justice, democracy, respect for human rights, equality,



non-discrimination, good governance and good faith".

While Canada (along with the U.S., Australia and New Zealand), refused to sign it in 2007, all have since accepted it. It was not so much a change of heart, as {self-servingly} deciding that existing laws already abide by the Charter's provisions.

Progress has been made, but places like Attawapiskat reveal the **depth** of the core problems. As a church dedicated to peace and justice <u>we must not remain silent</u> in the midst of such appalling poverty and despair, but instead find that just, restorative (for us all) "bridge to Attawapiskat".



Outreach

There are two key initiatives underway at this time, sponsorship of a refugee family and the congregational blessing.

After much discussion and deliberation our congregation decided to become a private sponsor of a refugee family. This means the congregation is responsible for providing the funds to support a family for one year and for assisting the family to adjust to life in Canada.

We have signed an Memorandum of Understanding with the Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) and are waiting to have a family assigned to our congregation. A core group of people within the congregation have committed to being available to assist the sponsorship. The plan is to locate the family in the Langley area as this is an accessible locale for the core group of people. The timelines are not known but in the mean time there is much to do, Chris Phelps lead an adult class on Sunday mornings in the month of May to discuss expectations and roles

We have set aside the monies to support the family but additional contributions are welcome. Simply bring or send your donation to the Church and designate the donation as for the "refugee family." If you are thinking of contributing your time please contact Chris Phelps so that he can give you more information as it becomes available. In addition to assist the refugees with immediate needs the team leaders also approved a \$5000 donation to the UN World Hunger Fund.

How did we have the monies to support a family for a year?

We have been blessed with bequests from a number of congregants and so we had funds at the ready to make the commitment. Reaching out to those in need is a good way to use monies left by those who reached out in their lives. In addition, we are now sharing our facility with two other congregations. This has been a big change for the congregation as there are now significant limitations on our use of the building. The monies brought in from building use have freed up financial resources to do more outreach and more programming.

If you wish to use the Vancouver facility for an event, advance notice is required. Our facility use is on our website on the calendar and for more information please contact Vic Suddaby.




