Creative activities coordinator - to find and assist leaders for a wide variety of creative activities to help individuals connect to God through their creativity.



This morning, as I am writing, it is snowing in Edmonton. Not a heavy snow. Not our first snow. Just enough to remind us that summer is well behind us and winter is on its way. Winter is experienced in different ways across our geographically diverse mission centre: from the occasional snow in Victoria and the lower mainland of BC, through the very heavy snowfalls in the mountains, to the sometimes long, white, and bone-chilling cold winters of the prairies (although maybe not quite so long and bone-chilling in recent years!). Whatever may be your experience of it, winter is something that tends to unite us as Canadians. We love to enjoy the good times where-ever we are. And we love to tell whoever is getting the bad storm or really cold weather this week, "I am sure glad I don't live where you live!"

In our church life in Canada West Mission Centre, our conferences provide regular opportunities to come together and mutually remind ourselves that "the church" is more than our Sunday morning services in our fourteen individual congregations.



We will be holding our second annual "Canada West Mission Centre E-Conference" on Saturday, February 2, 2019. This provides us the opportunity to "gather" electronically for a couple of hours without the need to travel long distances to enjoy the fellowship. Watch for details as the time gets closer. mindful practices. Some of which have helped me already.

After lunch, we had options on activities to "fill your cup". LISA NEUDORF

At the end of September, I attended the BC Women's Retreat. Our theme was "The Cup of Our Life" and on Saturday afternoon, attendees were given a list of activities to fill their cup. One of the activities was to offer apples, oranges and water to the homeless people living in Chilliwack. Rosilyn Coulson-Teng and me both felt led to do this and despite feeling very nervous we headed out "to look for homeless people". It was not as easy as we thought it would be. Rosilyn and I had a couple of encounters but walked for quite a while before we found a park with a number of homeless people.

In the park Rosilyn and I met Claire Miller who asked us to pray for her. Claire's prayer was simple: for her to find a safe place to sleep that night, for her to find a place to live and reassurance someday she would be reunited with her soul mate who died in February. As Rosilyn and I sat with Claire, she showed us a small Bible someone had given her. Claire was excited to show us the pictures. She talked about how pretty and colourful they were and in her next breath she told us how a year ago she would never have "done something like this". Claire was interested in the Bible, so I took the opportunity to share my favourite scripture The Parable of the Lost Sheep. We talked about how Jesus loves us and each of us matter to Him and He will take

the time to search for just one person if they are lost. Claire wanted us to continue reading so we read The Parable of the Lost Coin and the Parable of the Prodigal Son. Claire was curious and had many questions which we tried to answer to the best of our ability. Rosilyn and I spent about half an hour sitting in the grass talking with Claire and listening to her story. We learned last year her father died from Huntington's disease, her boyfriend died in February, her dog died, she lost her home and she inherited Huntington's disease from her father. Despite this, Claire had hope for a better future, she simply wanted reassurance God loves her and she mattered.

When we said goodbye to Claire, we hugged, and she thanked us for taking the time to talk to her. Words cannot describe how we were moved by Claire's story and our encounter. As Rosilyn and I walked away, we silently processed until we tried to find the words to describe the experience.

Since then, I've repeatedly thought about Claire and considered where God was in this experience. God was with Rosilyn and I as we walked. talked and each time we offered a piece of fruit or water. We knelt down and looked in the eyes of people as

we handed them fruit and water. We saw the hardship, the addiction, the reality those we met have no where to live. They carry their belongings in plastic shopping bags and knapsacks. How were Rosilyn and I viewed? Were we simply a couple of middle aged, welldressed, white do-gooders who spent an hour handing out fruit and water to only go back to our comfortable lives? Did we make a difference at least for one day?

Our ministry to Claire was listening and validating her as a human being. Claire's ministry to us was cheerfulness and optimism when she had a number of reasons to feel angry and helpless. God wants us to live with our eyes open. To see the people, we cross paths with. The person who looks like me and the person whose appearance or demeanor scares me. To have the courage to act when God plants the thought in our head to say or do something outside our comfort zone. Our world is filled with people who are hurting and yearning for connection. What activity will you do to fill your cup and whose cup will

you fill?

Following the video, Margo Long,

Executive Director of YESS spoke about the help YESS provides for vulnerable and high-risk youth and young adults in our community.

Margo taught us that when children grow up in unstable and dysfunctional families, they experience repeated trauma and crises. These unhealthy early experiences can literally rewire a child's brain.

Margo went on to explain that although most of the young people who find their way to YESS look like teens and young adults, mentally and emotionally they are much younger; 8-year old's in adult bodies who lack the confidence, experience or support to be successful students, employees or most importantly, family members.

'Walking beside' these young people as they learn the skills needed to become functional adults takes time. It takes time and patience to develop healthy relationships with frightened, distrustful children who have never experienced such.


It takes time to trust that there will be a safe place to sleep every night and food to eat every day. It takes more time to believe that they are welcome at the table and in the community.

It takes time to learn how to do things...to complete tasks such as preparing a salad and mopping the floors; and then to believe that they are capable of being responsible contributing members of their community. It takes time and experience to learn how it feels to be successful, whether at mopping a floor or completing a school assignment.

It takes time, because the brains of these young malleable children have been traumatized and harmed to such an extent that they are unable to think, create, understand, react and respond in the manner our society says is 'normal'.

By 'walking with' skilled, compassionate and trustworthy adults, the kids at YESS learn to trust and become trustworthy; learn to respect and become worthy of respect; learn to set their imaginations free and to believe in their dreams; learn to love themselves

By helping to offset the cost of tangible necessities for kids at YESS, Community of Christ helps the skilled staff at YESS 'walk beside' these young people while they acquire the intangible necessities needed to



live healthy productive lives. Thank you.

Mark your calendars! Community Fun Walk 2019 is tentatively scheduled for May 26, 2019.





Peace & Justice: Leaven in Populist Times Part I & II Rod Downing

Part I Gustavo has been transformed – forever changed! A true story, there is now, in this case, one less person who will ever be against LGBTQ rights. The recent Mission Conference learned this change came about because of Virginia, canvassing in California for LGBTQ rights, who knocked on Gustavo's door. The partial conversation went almost word-for-word as follows:

<u>Virginia:</u> . . . Would you be in support of such {transgender rights} legislation?

<u>Gustavo</u>: Oh, . . . no, I couldn't. . . . I'd be worried about predatory men – you know - um, using the law as an opportunity to enter women's bathrooms.

<u>Virginia</u>: I see. And why do you feel that way?

<u>Gustavo</u>: I'm from South America, and in South America we don't like fags.

<u>Virginia:</u> {in a friendly manner} Hhmmm. Interesting. I'm gay. (*1)

<u>Gustavo:</u> {quizzical, curious} Oh? (*2)

Virginia then shares how finding a wonderful partner has been such a support for her in a society that still struggles to accept LGBTQ relationships. Gustavo feels a kinship, telling her that his wife is a disabled person and many people feel sad for him. But he feels that God gave him the gift to take care of her, and that taking care of one another is what matters. Recognizing the similarity of their situations, Gustavo says "Listen, I was probably mistaken" about his earlier comments, and that he would be in support of the legislation.

This transformative dialogue didn't just happen. At (*1) it is clear that Virginia was well-anchored – she had a solid sense of dignity and self-respect, and thus didn't feel the need to be reactive to Gustavo's off-handed slur. Instead she remained in dialogue, giving a non-threatening affirmation of who she was, which also allowed her to see if there were any cracks of openness to further the dialogue.

And at (*2) Gustavo showed some slight openness that allowed the dialogue to continue. Again, Virginia's skill showed – she humanized what could have been a

caustic topic. In doing so, it resonated with Gustavo, whose openness allowed him to enter new and freeing terrain.

Slowing down the notion of dialogue, as above, demonstrates how crucial the layer of "inner peace" is to any endeavour. Virginia wouldn't always find such receptive audiences, but she had the skill to maximize chances of success.

In the broader context, it should also be noted that at point (*1) Virginia could have opted loosely to "speak truth to power", that is, to call out Gustavo for the slur he made. It seems she decided first to check for that sliver of openness, found it and went the transformation route instead. Dialogue is both art and skill, and at least for me, the best I can do is "bumble" my way along, though with God's Spirit of Goodness it becomes a "bumbling forward".

Populism: The dialogue sample was given because the Peace/Justice session at our mission conference dealt with "Populism", a slippery term which among other things, creates caustic divisions among people – the complete antithesis of "all created in God's image". Most commonly populism creates the notion of a "pure people" – whether white conservative Americans, traditional British, or "France for the French" – and thus also an impure people. It also focuses on a "corrupt elite" and the "Outcasts" (usually immigrants and refugees).

While Canada is not engulfed in populist dynamics, the pull exists, partly because as noted in the session, part of the underlying cause of populism is global in nature. And the best time to tackle populism is to be proactive, to strengthen healthy dynamics and keep populism from taking root.

The session ended with the above sample dialogue since it remains the key nonviolent resource for change, and the divisive nature of populism desperately needs such bridges.

Part II: However, dialogue is only

one resource; here are a few more.



Global: At the grand scale we can search out groups trying to reform our global dynamics (e.g., the UN), including our economic dynamics, etc., since badly skewed global dynamics can play a role in populism. Plus, supporting NGOs like World Accord strengthen our global fabric.

Facts: Populism has highly distortive dynamics. Firstly, we need to <u>broaden</u> <u>our own sources</u> if we have become "siloed" or in-grown. Secondly, in the internet age, we must recognize that nothing is free and that includes reliable news. We need explicitly to <u>fund</u> reputable news sources to keep good journalists in the field, providing us with solid information and a check against manipulative scripts. Related we can <u>fund fact-checking</u> – populism can swamp us with falsehoods and a deliberate concerted effort is needed to counter this.

Presence: While facts are essential to keep us anchored, they often will not persuade. The previous newsletter dealt with bias, in particular Confirmation Bias (once a decision is made one heeds information that supports the stance & downplays other information). Worse, if one is susceptible to the Backfire Effect, presenting that person with facts that contradict their stance, will simply reinforce their stance (this notion is still in debate), akin to "digging in your heels".

Here is where simple presence can make the difference, rare as it can be. For example, a double redemption, an ex -Neo-Nazi Buddhist helps transform Buckley, a Klan member and army veteran who hated Muslims. Caring patience, and yes, it includes bumbling [Washington Post, 20180605]. I could never help Buckley, but "leaven" is about being sensitive to where and to whom God's Spirit calls each of us. Canada is not immune from populism, and now is the time to strengthen the moderate middle and transform or at least diminish the distorters, via God's leavening influence through us. All are beloved by God who wants healing and wholeness for all of us together.

Creating Connection BC - Debra Donohue




I'm told it was gloriously windy on the day I was born, right at breakfast time in April, and 11 days too soon. They were aiming for the 17th and I was born on the 6th. Both my father and my grandpa Robertson (my mom's dad) were born on April 17th. That was the day the first chapter of my life began. There have been many chapters in my life, many different jobs, hobbies, sports and many, many friends. Each chapter has been surprisingly different from the previous one, some unbearably sad, while others made me feel like I was the luckiest person on the planet. I consider myself extremely fortunate to have had the variety of experiences and challenges that each of these chapters provided me, and I hope I have learned at least one nugget of wisdom from each of them.



So, it should come as no surprise to me, or you, that another new chapter in my book of life has begun. As of October 1st, I started a new position with Community of Christ. My official title is Creating Connection Director BC. I will

be working a little less with the congregations, and a little more with the public in an effort to make meaningful connections. Some of you have already seen my presentation on 'Coffee and Conversation' at the Women's Retreat in Chilliwack, and by the time you receive this newsletter I will have presented to both Victoria and Meadow Ridge. Coffee and Conversation is an opportunity to hold mindful, meaningful and spiritual conversations with people who generally would not want to meet in a church, or place of organized religion.



I know it sounds a little radical, but with the decline in church membership, in all religions and all churches, we need to try new ways to reach those who are craving meaningful, mindful and spiritual conversations, but who aren't interested in church because of preconceived notions. The Canada East Mission Centre has been using a website called meetup.com to advertise their Coffee and Conversations, Mindfulness Meetings, Yoga and more with good success and we will start using it too.

Our first 'meetup' scheduled is a Coffee and Conversation for people who want to practice their English, and enjoy mindful conversation. It takes place in the Vancouver church activity hall on Thursdays from 10:30 – noon, beginning November 15th. As I write

this, we have rsvp's from four people. Two from the congregation and two more from outside the church who have seen the advertising on meetup.com.

I'm working with some of you to create online groups for meditation, yoga, and meaningful conversation using Zoom a virtual meeting space. Watch for quarterly Nurturing Spirit online gatherings, and a youth online group similar to Community Place in Ontario. Community Place started as an online gathering for senior high youth to connect once a month to maintain their friendships from camp throughout the year. Our plan in BC is to do just that, and to talk about current issues for teens, plan youth group activities, offer input to camps and retreats, and have meaningful conversations with each other.

It's time to start utilizing meetup.com to invite people outside the church to many of our existing activities. For example, we'll be promoting the Nurturing Spirit Retreat, Nurturing Silence Retreat, Weekend of World Religions events and BC Friends and Family Weekend on meetup.com. These are activities we already do, and do very well, that are perfect safe entry points for making connections with new people and providing opportunities for meaningful, spiritual and mindful conversations.

I'll be talking to lots of you in the coming weeks and presenting ideas in your congregations. Wow - There's a lot happening in the Vancouver congregation over the next few months. Fasten your seatbelts, it's gonna get crazy in here!

Advent is coming up quick, and Christmas activities start with the annual 'Hanging of the Green' on the morning of November 18th. Greetings -

As I prepare to close out my Community of Christ Seminary experience in a few weeks, I have been reflecting on the past two years of study. I entered this program very green (yet energetic!) in my approach to theology, scripture, and Community of Christ history, I began Seminary with primarily two goals: (1) to gain the knowledge necessary to speak to the authentic nature of Community of Christ to a broad audience of members, friends, and seekers and (2) to re-engage the topics of scripture and theology in a safe, academic environment, free from the hurtful rhetoric I internalized as a member of the queer community. While I feel strongly that I have grown tremendously in both of these areas, I have found my overall progress to be gradual considering my strained relationship with scripture due to historic oppressive policies and theological ideologies towards queer people. Despite this, I see this journey of

re-engagement to be most important in my life and ministry in the church. Feeling comfortable to engage the scriptures and worthy enough to encounter the Divine are foundational elements for any theologian. Rest assured, attending Community of Christ Seminary in 2018 does not gloss over the details of our

faith movement's history. Yes, the church has changed immensely



over the years, but the knowledge gained from my time in Seminary has allowed me to speak intelligently with older and younger generations alike about the church of the past, present, and future. It holds great meaning for all of us.

Seminary has brought the Mission Initiatives to life for me. These five life-giving focuses of the church have long been important to me but learning the ways in which Community of Christ evolved to value these five areas was incredibly impactful for me. This evolution is an ongoing collaborative effort of theological discernment, prayer, historical context, continuing revelation, global community, common consent, and a call to be a prophetic people. Recognizing and appreciating the intentional, organic journey that props up each mission initiative allows me to see mission being made real through the struggles, efforts, successes and failures of the church. We are part of that evolution, and our contributions along the timeline are and will have an impact on this journey. An unanticipated takeaway from the Community of Christ Seminary program was the sense of ownership I have gained for my faith community. I am not simply here to sit in a pew on Sunday mornings, but rather to push, challenge, engage, and speak out to hold us accountable to our own faith and beliefs.

I want to personally thank each and every one of you who supported me throughout my Seminary studies. Your theological knowledge, organizational memory, and passion for this church have inspired me spiritually and academically.


