THE EXPERIENCE WORSHIP PROJECT

The Experience Worship Project was born after I attended the FLOW Weekend at Meadow Ridge with Sean Langdon in September 2017. He was the featured ministry, and the classes on creative worship were excellent! I knew that we, in Chilliwack, needed to hear more. I called Pastor Shonnet Allen on my way home and she told me to go ahead and organize it.

The weekend started on Friday night with creative games led by Debra Donohue. These were meant to get us thinking outside the box and to get our creative juices flowing. There were word association games, which were very difficult to start, but became easier once we got into it. We each had to create pictures starting with the same two lines. It was interesting to see how different they turned out, even though we started with the same lines. To finish the night, we broke into two teams and had to solve a







problem with the few items on hand. It was a fun evening!

Saturday, we discussed many aspects of worship, including what people want from worship to what constitutes worship (it's not just about 1 hour on Sunday anymore!) to how we can provide worshipful experiences by doing different things.

After a great day of class sessions and dinner together, we went on a creative team-building expedition to the Escape Room in Abbotsford. Two teams tried to escape two different situations. These Escape Rooms really make one think in a non-linear fashion and force one to consider multiple aspects while working together to solve issues and attain a common goal. It was an excellent choice for team-building and kept us thinking outside the box.

Sunday morning, Sean lead the adult class at church, which was focused on the congregation's responsibilities and contributions to the worship experience. Everyone is responsible for the worship experience, not just those with organizational roles



(presiders, speaker, musician, ushers, etc.). We then had a creative worship service, with Sean leading Faith Interviews with Debra Donohue and me. This was a wonderful way to get to know people more than just peripherally and provided a spiritual insight into our lives.

Following a delicious potluck lunch, we went on a community Prayer Walk. We walked around the neighborhood for about 45 minutes spending time in prayer, focusing on different aspects of the neighborhood. These prayers were focused on families and children, pets and veterinarians, first responders, seniors, business owners, and many other aspects of everyday life.

When we got back to the church, we took a group selfie, which ended our fun and creative

LISA NEUDORF - WEEKEND OF WORLD RELIGIONS

I was recently in Calgary to participate in a Weekend of World Religions presented by Brian Carwana of the Encounter World Religions Centre in Toronto. The weekend events focus on four different religions and Brian leads classes which discuss the history, teachings and practices of those faiths followed by a visit to the house of worship for the specific religions. Over the last few years, Canada West Mission attendees have studied Hinduism, Islam, Sikhism, Buddhism, Judaism, Mormonism, Daoism and Native Spirituality to name a few.

I have appreciated the opportunity to learn and understand different faiths. It would be fair to say my view of the world has been broadened and I have usually been able to find key elements from each faith which spoke to my heart.

I have found there are many similarities between Christianity and the principles followed by other faith traditions. I have appreciated the discipline practiced by Muslims, the generosity and sense of community practiced by Sikh's, the peaceful centering of oneself through Tai Chi led by Daoists and the stories passed down from generation to generation in Native Spirituality. I have sensed God's presence during each of these visits and have realized each faith tradition believes in God or a higher power whether it is God (Christianity), Allah (Islam), YHWH Yahweh (Judaism), or one of the numerous ways Sikh's describe God.

CWM has been providing Weekend of World Religions in Vancouver and Calgary for the past few years. The EWR Centre also provides a Discovery Week annually in July which explores Buddhism, Christianity, Daiosm, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, Native, Rasta, Sikhism, Wicca and Zoroastrianism. PEACE AND JUSTICE - ROD DOWNING

Peace / Justice: The Subtle, Pervasive Effects of Bias

Bias is a natural part of being human given four aspects that pull on our energy: the need to act fast, too much information, not enough meaning, and deciding what we should remember. Biases have become mental short-cuts. Because bias has always been around we have some ability to detect it. But today we now have a much more refined sense of this phenomenon so it is worth a second look, given how drastically it can affect peace / justice.

Look at the diagram – which line (B, C, D, E) is the same length as Line A? Did you know that if you created an experiment and got several fake subjects (who were really working with you) plus a real subject, and started the session by having all the fake subjects say that D is the same length as A, that the real subject will <u>agree</u> (at least once) with this objectively false answer <u>a shocking three-quarters</u> of the time?

<u>Conformity Bias</u> is a natural outcome of being human – we want to belong, and deeper, from an evolutionary standpoint, we have needed to belong in order to survive. But that same positive attribute, like all others, also has a downside – we can be unduly swayed. It is not simply a cute mental game – in this case it is a key part of what allows for everything from people falling into human trafficking, to racism, to radicalization.

We are called to see people as God does and to be leaven in the cause of shalom for all. That call is hampered and distorted by our biases. Fortunately, step one in reducing their effect is deliberately to examine them. This can reduce their grip and thus help unbridle the effect of God's Good Spirit.

Wikipedia lists 175 biases (which made me want to add one more "Wikipedia Suspicion"; my point is this topic needs more refining but unquestionably there are more than I ever imagined and is why for years I call my efforts "Bumbling" – I seem to mess up in so many ways). Here are a few biases, perhaps more relevant in a world noted in a previous article, being pulled by "populism".

<u>Bias blind spot</u>: Failing to recognize your cognitive biases is a bias in itself. Princeton psychologist Emily Pronin has found that "<u>individuals</u> see the existence ... of biases much more in others than in themselves." Sound like a scripture about a speck in someone's eye and a plank in one's own?

<u>Confirmation Bias</u>: We tend to give priority to new information that confirms our existing stance. Together with the next two, it is partly what keeps us siloed and thus in conflict rather than dialogue.

Bandwagon Effect: Adopting a belief increases based on the number of people who hold that belief. A form of groupthink.

<u>Choice-supportive bias</u>: When you choose something, you tend to feel positive about it, <u>even if the choice has flaws</u>. We think that our dog is awesome - even if it bites people every once in a while. Or, once we have chosen your group, we are less likely to see its flaws.

These subtle, pervasive little building blocks called biases, can end up building terribly harmful life-denigrating dynamics. Let us continually be open to God's Spirit of Goodness which accepts us as we are, but calls forth our better selves, all for the sake of life-flourishing for all!

Nurturing Spirit Retreat: Learning to Walk in the Dark

"I have learned things in the dark that I could never have learned in the light, things that have saved my life over and over again...I need darkness as much as I need light."

"Come to the dark side!" are words that strike fear into the heart of any loyal Star Wars fan. We close our eyes in fear of what Luke will do, and perhaps discover there are things to be learned in the dark that could not be learned in the light.

That's exactly what we did at our Nurturing Spirit retreat this year. We took a walk on the dark side and unmasked Darth Vader. Based on Barbara Brown Taylor's book, "Learning to Walk in the Dark", we took time to explore the meaning of darkness in our lives and learned spiritual practices that help us "feel" our way into the shadowy places in our minds and bodies.

Darkness comes in many forms, whether physical, emotional, mental, or spiritual.

We used three key phrases to help guide us during the week-end: "Cultivate Curiosity" about our experience, "Trust in Spirit's Wisdom Within", and "Stay in the Moment". Through the practices of centering prayer and meditation, we



learned how to connect with the "Spirit breathing in us". We learned how to slow down to dip beneath the surface of our busy distracted minds, shining the "light sabre" of our awareness into thoughts and feelings hidden in the shadows. We practiced gentle movement and yoga to relax and

compassionate way. We shared time in "Listening to the Soul" groups, sharing about our experience of darkness: our sadness, our fears, our joy, our pain. Giving voice to the things that live in our shadow self, somehow allows a crack of light in to be healed.

We also had our own team of eight Jedi Knights (our Youth Spirit Kitchen) who were fearlessly led by Princess Lana to provide healthy delicious food all weekend to the army of spiritual seekers courageously learning to walk in the dark. Like all good Jedi's, they were in fine form, learning new skills and life lessons in the kitchen of life. The food they prepared and served, definitely raised the "Life Force" in all of us.

Saturday night (after a candle lit dinner) we literally took a walk in the "almost dark" under the moonlit sky of Samish Island. We began in the CFC together to receive instructions, then went outside, and allowed ourselves to learn the lessons inherent in physical darkness. Some people stayed behind where Shannon guided the group gently into darkness, slowly turning off the inside lamps one by one as darkness descended.

Sunday morning, we had a beautiful worship service as we slowly began to emerge from our journey from shadow back into the light. We started with all the lamps off, and most fittingly, our trusty young Jedi Knights brought the light back, turning the lamps and candles on, one by one as we all emerged from the darkness into the



dawning of a new day. May the Force be with you.



Youth Spirit Kitchen and Retreat

Just before 8:30 AM Saturday morning the bell rang for breakfast. As the retreat participants stepped up to take their first meal of the day I was taken with sudden realization there was no place for me to help on the serving line. Nine youth and two youth mentors had it well in hand! David and I need only stand back and watch the Youth Spirit Kitchen engage in purpose. This year our scripture focus came from Matthew 4:1-11 where Jesus is tempted in the wilderness. Within these verses "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.' We focused on listening to each other, listening to the needs of the group we were serving, talking about faith, and

learning how to work through challenges with food as a team.

I was deeply impressed and moved by the adventurous spirit of this group. Some people came into the kitchen never having peeled a carrot, or dipped strawberries in chocolate. Certainly, none of us had cooked Vegetarian Shepherd's pie before but I just loved the curiosity and openness to try: Not to mention to see things through so that all 61 of us were fed for a whole week end! This group said YES to new challenges with big smiles, open hearts and a real commitment to hard work. We took time out to venture into the wilderness at

Samish and pay attention to the local food and wildlife. A highlight was finding a small skull under a tree and figuring out what it was although there may be some debate. We collected pine needles and made medicine tea, and, Kit made a huge pot of Chai (back by popular demand from last year). The youth also took the leadership in building a dark room for the adult participants to experience "dark meditative eating".

I would like to thank the other retreat participants for honoring the spirit of the youth kitchen by doing dishes and keeping tasks manageable. This was a huge gift. And we especially appreciated the help and support of new kitchen manager Shawna Custer. As a group we are excited that group grew since last year and we are now wondering about how to action new activities together between retreats (like taking on some of the ideas envisioned in the Are You an Eagle in a Hen House session with Debra or doing a Fundraiser for Samish).

The tale of the eagle in a hen house tells the story of how an eagle egg, accidentally placed in a hen's nest see's the eagle grow up not fulfilling his potential, experiencing only the limitations of the life of a chicken. The YouTube video we watched has a 'new year's resolution' focus, but it was perfect for this class. We wanted the youth to realize that nothing should keep them from pursuing ANYTHING in this world. After some workshopping and lots of conversation, our Youth Spirit group came up with the following dreams for Samish Island.

Move the campground garden closer to Dining Hall – install a sprinkler system so it is taken care of between camps. Paintball field, dirt jump park

for bikes, gymnastic equipment and weight room. Goats for lawn control - need electric collars, rent goats for the summer. Put in a fence and lights for the sport court, better metal shop/work shop in basement, floating dock for the lake (build it in the new shop), obstacle course in the forest, with balance beams, jumping obstacles, rope webbing, and a tight rope. Put in a permanent dock at the lake. Better wifi, inner tubes, banana boat, spa room, and clean up the

path to the Indian burial ground.

Possession was to take place by August 1st which suddenly left us without a place to worship. So, we had a meeting to decide what to

purchase as our new Church building. What we needed was a place that was on all one level.



We found such a place at 667-Watt Street a few blocks from the old building. It is a small building that was used to house Autopac, the Provincial Insurance Company. It already had an alarm system and is located on a main Bus route with a small parking lot. These past few months we have been in

the process of satisfying all the City rules and steps one must do to make the place a Church. The major stumbling block has been converting the washroom for handicap use and the entrance accessible to the handicapped, a city requirement. Then having the place pass inspection by electrical, civil, and mechanical engineers. We are now in the final stages before we can occupy the building, hopefully this month. It has been a real learning experience with all its frustrations and expenses.

After the service the men of the congregation provided






a delicious brunch for everyone.

NEW CAMPING REGISTRATION PROGRAM

We are excited for this new tool for a number of reasons, but here are a few highlights:

Integrated payment processing

CampSite accepts credit/debit card and automatic debit withdrawal (other forms of payment are also accepted) and can even provide payment plans for parents/adults interested in spreading out the burden of event costs.*

*As CWM is on a donation-based registration, this feature will not be rolled out in CWM. You are encouraged to continue making donations in the manner in which you prefer. (Pre-Authorized Payments, CanadaHelps, cheque, cash, or otherwise)

Paperless process

CampSite takes the hassle of paper out of the equation. All forms have been converted to fillable PDF documents. This means, you will simply download the forms required for your event from CampSite, complete them on your device, and then upload them back to CampSite.

Centralization and standardization

All programs from coast-to-coast will eventually transition to CampSite, ensuring continuity and standardization, as well as overall familiarity for membership and friends.

By partnering with a third-party, we are able to better serve you in a professional manner while guaranteeing the safety of your information without the need for additional staff.

Details are stored in secure databases, protecting the details and information of our most valuable asset – you!

Due to the nature of CWM's geography, CampSite is perfect for us. Details entered into the program are immediately synced and made available to others using the system. This ensures efficiency, reducing the number of hours required to plan and execute an event.

Reporting - Because of the centralized nature of this platform, using CampSite will allow us to produce more accurate, consistent reports.

Security - Every effort has been made to protect your information. This platform has been vetted and approved by World Church and Canadian Leadership.
