

Parliamentary Guide

- A main motion must be moved, seconded, and stated by the Chair before it can be discussed
- If you approve the motion as it is, vote for it. If you disapprove the motion, in total, vote against it.
- If you approve the idea of the motion but want to change it, move to amend it by adding, deleting, or substituting.
- If you want competent advice to help you to make your decision, move to refer the motion to an appropriate person or committee with instructions to report back.
- If you feel that a person or committee can handle it better than the assembly, move to refer the motion with power to act.
- If the pending matter should be set aside temporarily because something more urgent has come up, move that it be laid on the table.
- If you want time to think the motion over, move that consideration be postponed to a certain time.
- If you think that further discussion is unnecessary, move to close debate.
- If you do not agree with a decision by the Chair, appeal the decision to the assembly.
- If you think that a matter introduced is not germane to the matter at hand, a question of order may be raised.
- If you think that too much time is being consumed by speakers, you can move a time limit on such speeches.
- If a motion has several parts and you wish to vote differently on these parts, move to divide the motion.

Using MIS (Ministerial Information System) June 16, 2019 the number of CWM delegates was calculated according to former Congregation membership numbers and distributed among respective congregations according to their book membership. The formula is one delegate per fifteen members with a minimum of two in any congregation.

Pastors may submit additional names of persons to serve as delegates in the fourteen days before the business meeting. These names will be presented to the business meeting and will be accepted by a vote of the business meeting as amendments to the "Report of the Credentials Committee."

Similarly, persons whose names need to be withdrawn as delegates for any reason may be dealt with by a letter from the Pastor and substitutes may be named. These changes will also be dealt with as amendments to the "Report of the Credentials Committee."

Non-resident members may be represented in a business meeting in a similar ratio from each province. Delegates may be appointed by the Mission Centre President at least 2 weeks prior to the business meeting. Non-resident members can "volunteer" to serve as delegates with notice to the Mission Centre President no later than two weeks prior to the business meeting.

Porcupine Plain congregation will be closing in 2019. Membership has dwindled to three persons. The expense and effort to maintain the building is no longer justified.

Report from the Mission Centre President To the 2019 Canada West Mission Centre Conference

The highlights and accomplishments in the Canada West Mission Centre of the past year are primarily the responsibility of the staff and the volunteers who actually do most of the hands-on work. Elsewhere in this program you will read about youth camps and retreats, reunions and family camps, audits and budgets, and probably meetups, websites and Facebook pages. I will concentrate this report on congregations.

As has become my custom, I have tried to visit each congregation at least once through the year. In the past twelve months I missed getting to Prince Albert and Winnipeg. I had a visit to Winnipeg planned in February, then had a family situation come up that prevented me from going. Dar Shepherdson was planning to go with me. He went anyway and I understand the visit went well. I will be trying to get to both Prince Albert and Winnipeg this fall.

I have begun work with Saskatoon on a mission discernment process. Discussions about a similar process have started with Lethbridge and Meadow Ridge but circumstances have prevented any substantive progress just yet. Please talk to me if your congregation might be interested in working out its mission priorities.

Saskatoon also held a very successful congregational priesthood retreat last fall (with others invited) with David Lloyd providing the guest ministry. If you ever have the chance to hear David talk about the sacraments, take advantage of the opportunity. He does an excellent and well-researched presentation.

As mentioned at the end of the e-Conference in February, the Porcupine Plain congregation has discontinued operation. The property has been for sale since June, but there have been no offers yet. Sam and I continue working with the pastor on winding down the financial accounts of the congregation.

Circumstances allowed me to make two visits to the BC congregations – one in October following the Samish Campground Board meeting, and one in January along with Art Smith following his being the guest ministry at the "Not-a-Men's Retreat." Which brings up the effort to establish a BC Men's Retreat that did not work out. We tried. And we learned a few things. Primarily we learned that renting a facility in the Meadow Ridge area made the registration cost just too expensive. Secondly, we learned that mostly everybody (not the men by themselves) just likes to get together given the opportunity. When the Men's Retreat was cancelled, we converted it to a day-program at Chilliwack and ended up with over thirty people attending – from all four congregations! – on less than a week's notice. We will see what we can do about a similar event in the future.

We thank Edmonton for hosting this year's conference. If you look outside you will see that they have been dealing with a large municipal infrastructure project: construction of a Light Rail Transit line. They recently concluded, through their lawyers, successful negotiations with the City of Edmonton overcompensation for expropriation of a piece of the property needed for the construction.

I wish to acknowledge all of the staff of the Canada West Mission Centre (Debra Donohue, Lisa Neudorf, Parker Johnson, and Sam Smalldon) for the wonderful work that they do on your behalf. I wish to particularly acknowledge Sam's contribution in coming on as Mission Centre Financial Officer in a volunteer capacity.

You will see the most visible benefit of his work in the two audits for 2017 and 2018 in this meeting's agenda package. This brings us up to date on audits for the first time since September 2014.

After the staff there are the volunteers who make so much happen as well. Reports from some of them appear in this booklet. I will miss people if I try to name them – from mission centre appointees to camp directors and staff to congregational leaders. All of you make our programs and systems work. Thank you!

Creating Connection and Communications

Creating Something Unexpected

If nothing else were to come out of my time with Creating Connection, it would be enough for me to know I have met so many interesting, compassionate and kind people who I never would have met otherwise. The biggest surprise to me though, was completely unexpected.



As most of you know, in October of 2018, my position with the Canada West Mission centre as Congregational Outreach Specialist ended and I began a new position as the Creating Connection Director for British Columbia. I spend 70% of my time on my Creating Connection projects.

This is part of a pilot project in Canada where we reach out to the public using a social media site called meetup. We create mindful, meaningful, spiritual activities and experiences for the public, outside of church, and with no agenda to get them to church. My role as Director is to help church members get their own meetups started while maintaining one of my own as well. The meetups are widely different, from Prayer Shawl Knitting to drum circles to conversations. The only real requirement is that your meetup be something you absolutely love, so it's never a chore for you to facilitate.

I currently facilitate two activities per week with Creating Connection. I'm sure you've heard about Coffee and Conversation which takes place on Thursdays from 10:30 to noon. Although some attendees may check us out once or twice, some come out regularly and we develop great relationships. Coffee and Conversation works a lot like the 'Holy Listening' we do at church. I choose a topic, each person has time to speak to that topic without comments from the group, while the group practices listening. I can't tell you how many times people have shared that it is wonderful it is to talk without interruption and really feel they are being heard. The listening without interjecting can be a little more of a challenge for some, but we're not seeking perfection here, just practicing our skills. We have between two and nine people show up each week.

My second weekly group is called 'Walk on the Sunnyside' We look at the last 24 hours and find the silver lining or seek out the nuggets of good in our previous day. For some, it may not have been a great day and the challenge is to keep the conversation positive. We walk while we talk, at Confederation Park in Burnaby, which is a large, beautiful park with lots of great amenities, and it just happens to be the neighbourhood I grew up in as a child, right next door to my elementary school. We have between two and nine people show up for this group as well. Our conversations in this group move back and forth quickly in a happy, chattering fashion.

Now I know I said that we avoid focusing on church but here is an exception. The Chilliwack congregation has experimented with advertising their existing social activities on meetup.com. They have regulars outside of the church community attend Sunday night meditation, and prayer shawl knitting. We're continuing to think outside the box, and that can mean any number of things. I know of two more potential meetups that should be starting up in the next few months in BC, I'll be sure to let you know about them once they begin.

We also advertise some of our Community of Christ non-religious, yet spiritual activities on meetup. These are The Nurturing Spirit Retreat, Friends and Family Weekend, Weekend of World Religions, Nurturing Silence Retreat, and our Day of Nurturing Spirit events.

Now back to the unexpected part. As I disclose to the meetup attendees that the parent company I work for is Community of Christ, a church, and that at no time will I ever ask for donations or try to get people to come to church – all of a sudden people want to know about my church! I hear comments like "Wow this sounds like a really cool church, what is the name again?" "Tell me more about your church" "Really? Your church has hired you to plan nice things for us and not try to get us to go to church?" Sometimes these questions and comments will go on to the point where they become disruptive to the group and I have to stop the questions and offer to stay after our meetup is finished to talk more about Community of Christ. People are coming to church, to retreats and social functions. It's like I have a secret, and everyone wants to know what it is.

So, what is this Creating Connection pilot project supposed to accomplish? The short answer is that we simply don't know yet. It's a pilot project that seems to be working really well. I'm very happy with the response from the public who want to attend our meetups, I'm over the moon happy with the questions about Community of Christ, and thrilled that people are coming out to church functions to check us out.

I invite you to join me at one of my meetups so you can have a better idea of what we do. Do you want to start up a meetup group? Let me know, and if you're not in my area, I'll put you in touch with someone who can help you in your area.

Communications and Administrative Assistant to Steve Thompson

The other 30% of my job consists of planning events like this one, Canada West Mission Centre Conference, which is a very large event. At this point we have our host congregation confirmed for 2020 and our guest ministry booked, Joey Williams, MCP for the British Isles, Western Europe and Eurasia. As Mission Conference Manager, planning takes place throughout the year, and it definitely builds as we get closer to the conference. There are a whole host of smaller tasks that I do in my communications role and as Steve Thompson's administrative assistant. They range from daily to weekly to monthly, and some are only annual tasks.

Registration point of contact for delegates at MC Conference and World Conference
Posting flyers and events to CWM social media

There are many more small tasks that I only seem to remember once they come up, so if you need help and don't know who to ask, you should probably ask me first. If I can't help, I'll direct you to the person who can.

Church Mission and Young Adult Ministries

What follows is my 2018-2019 staff report for your review and questions. I have chosen to simply provide a bullet-point list of accomplishments along with details since we were last together at the 2018 Mission Conference. I'd like to take this moment to express my gratitude for your support, as nothing I do can be accomplished alone. The purpose of this summary is to share a progress report of my areas of focus.

While my position title has remained the same since being hired in 2016 (*Church Mission & Young Adult Ministry Specialist*), my function has shifted over the years due to the changing needs of the church in Canada. My position is now a split role, with 30% of my time committed to Canadian (CWM/CEM) marketing efforts (predominantly project-based) and the other 70% committed to the Calgary Congregation's revitalization. While officially my position description does not include young adult ministry, this is still an area of deep importance for me. We are blessed in western Canada with incredibly committed young adults who continue to engage with our denomination in meaningful ways at camps, retreats, local youth and young adult activities, Sunday services, young adult support groups, local volunteerism, and more. I continue to work alongside these inspiring young people to provide support and pastoral care when needed.

Canadian Marketing (30%)

Canada West/East Social Media Account Management

Details: Collaborating with CEM counterparts to manage, schedule, and develop content for CEM and CWM social media accounts.

Key Tasks: Content Development, Social Media Monitoring, Marketing Strategy

Canada West Instagram Account Launch (November 2018)

Details: In order to better meet the needs of our members and seekers, it was important to launch an Instagram account to connect with those of a younger demographic. (Statistically, younger people are not on Facebook.) To commemorate the launch of this account, I coordinated a Young Adult "Instagram Takeover" (temporarily taking over another person/organization's account in order to share fresh, more personal content with their audience) to highlight the geographic diversity across CWM. Young Adults from Winnipeg to Vancouver worked collaboratively to post meaningful content showing us a window into life in their areas. We gained over 100 followers in just a few short days, raised a lot of awareness about our mission centre, and learned a great deal about our young people in the process. Check out our account @cofchristcwm to see these saved Instagram Stories and posts to our feed.

Key Tasks: Proposal, Concept/Design, Content Development, Volunteer Management, Marketing Strategy

Congregational Website Development (January 2019)

Details: A program committed to supporting local congregations in developing their own website presence. Face-to-face training is provided to ensure websites can be confidently managed locally. Trainees attend a three-day workshop with websites fully launched (and celebrated!) by the final day. At this time, only one workshop has taken place in CWM (Vancouver). Ask about hosting a workshop in your area!

Key Tasks: Proposal, Concept/Design, Content/Template Development, Marketing Strategy **REGGIE Launch** (April 2019)

Details: Development of an online event registration platform to better meet the needs of the mission centre while simultaneously centralizing event management data to increase efficiencies for event staff/planners.

Key Tasks: Proposal, Bid Process, Brand Identity, Marketing Strategy

Canadian Website Launch (April 2019)

Details: Development of a new cross-mission centre (CWM/CEM) website to better meet the needs of a changing church. A platform was selected to ensure multiple content creators could be trained around the country to own and manage their own sections of the website. This improves efficiencies and ensures the website is always up to date. The site structure was overhauled to better meet the needs of seekers and members. While the site launched in April 2019, ongoing maintenance of the website continues.

Key Tasks: Proposal, Bid Process, Concept/Design, Project Management, Change Management, Content Development, Marketing Strategy

Calgary Congregation (70%)

Building Transition

Details: The Calgary Congregation sold its Ranchlands facility in August 2016. Since then, we have actively worked to discern spiritual direction, needs, wants, and the financial feasibility of relocating to a new space. In the meantime, we have met in a temporary lease space that has allowed us to focus our attention on relationships, quality programming and worship experiences, and the needs of our community without the added stress of facility management. Throughout this time, we have held steady at 25 for average Sunday morning attendance. In late 2018 we published the findings of our feasibility study after reviewing more than 35 potential sites and calculating various financial scenarios. From the findings of this study, we have been able to further clarify our needs and wants within the framework of a financially sustainable model. This is an ongoing project.

Key Tasks: Liaison between Professional Groups and the Congregation, Survey Development/ Reporting/Analysis/Presentations, Facility Planning Team Chair, Site Visits, Project Management, Change Management, Research, Progress Tracking, Resource Development

Communications

Details: Using industry best practices, crafting a communication strategy to meet the needs of our community in order to provide measurable, sharable content via email marketing, social media, signage, and our website.

Key Tasks: Social Media Management, Website Management, Web Design, Content Creation, Graphic Design, Blogging, Marketing Strategy, Marketing Automation

Latter-day Seeker Ministry

Details: The Calgary Congregation seeks to support an environment of sharing, listening, and growth for members and friends of Latter-day Saint traditions. We seek to establish relationships with other members of this community in our area to celebrate our commonalities, learn about our distinctives, and share our personal stories. At present, we plan a minimum of four events each year with the possibility for ad hoc events between gatherings.

Key Tasks: Volunteer Management, Event Planning, Marketing Strategy, Budgeting, Proposals, Graphic Design, Content Development, Pastoral Care

Young Adult Ministry

Details: Working to establish and maintain relationships with young adult members and friends of Community of Christ. This includes casual meet-ups (dinners, coffee shops, hiking, float trips, game nights, etc.) as well as spiritual activities (camps and retreats).

Key Tasks: Volunteer Management, Event Planning, Budgeting, Communications, Networking, Pastoral Care

Congregational Revitalization

Details: Working alongside devoted members of the congregation, injecting new excitement surrounding programs, activities, and fellowship through special events, Sunday morning worship, youth activities, and the facility transition.

Key Tasks: Reports/Analysis/Presentations, Project Management, Change Management, Proposals, Technology Review/Improvements, Volunteer Management, Marketing Strategy, Communications, Home Visits, Pastoral Care

Community of Christ Seminary (Graduated Dec. 15, 2018)

Details: Community of Christ Seminary is a two-year Master of Arts in Religion program run through Graceland University. It is a hybrid program that is predominantly held online with four weeks spent on the ground in Independence at *Focus Sessions*. This rigorous program is meant to educate and prepare – through prayerful scholarship, teaching, service and mentoring – faithful, creative and discerning leaders for ministries in congregations, church and the world.

Key Tasks: Academic Research, Spiritual Practices, Reading and Writing Assignments, Presentations, Reports, etc.

Peace and Justice Report

CANADIAN PEACE / JUSTICE COMMITTEE June 2019 Report

The Committee was formed in April, 2007, primarily to support local congregations in our attempts to be ". . . dedicated to the pursuit of peace" and to "Share Christ's Peace." The committee was again hampered because: (a) the Chair was not able to give the committee adequate time; and (b) we feel we have hit the limit of available volunteer time for subcommittees.

I. ACTIONS THIS YEAR.

A. Continuing the Process of Developing Resources Related to First Nations Communities.

We have some key resources, thanks to the address by Barb Oldale at our 2017 Mission Conference, and also Tracy Smith. This is only a start – we would love help to: (a) allow congregations to explore the history and status of relations with First Nations, including the legacy of residential schools and the Truth and Reconciliation Report; (b) interact with our First Nations communities; (c) explore potential formal statements from the Canadian Field.

B. Create Social Media Resources.

We have created a Facebook Page and will continue to experiment with its possibilities. We will also start creating podcasts and webcasts, to expand our reach.

C. Maintained Our Current Projects and Our Peace / Justice Website.

While not an emphasis this year we have continued support for such endeavours as:

- a. Maintaining Resources to Develop Healthy Relations with our Muslim Community: This is centered on a hopeful, nonviolent strategy of trying to strengthen the reasonable voices within our own community, within the Muslim community and among society in general. It includes the opportunity for congregations to engage with their local Muslim community;
- b. Buying Fair Trade coffee where possible, which supports the "Abolish Poverty" initiative;
- c. Expanding the church's Canadian Peace / Justice website. Still fairly skeletal. If you see an unfilled area where you would like to help - we would love to hear from you!

D. Phase II - Subcommittees.

In 2014 we transitioned to the 2nd phase – creating **subcommittees** - to raise up and provide resources for those Canadian-specific issues that call us via recent inspired counsel to courageously challenge and help transform societal trends that diminish God's creation. Further topics include:

Mental Health & Eliminating Stigma **Human Trafficking close to your Church;**

Justice: Restorative not Punitive; Eco. Concerns: Water, GMOs, etc.

Child Poverty; ... Others? Foreign Aid, no strings attached; etc;

Inter-religious Relations;

Note: We have recognized that this phase has stretched our ability to tap into the available volunteer capacity of our Field and thus each year we will focus simply on one or two topics.

Climate Change Subcommittee: This subcommittee has just been started. It will begin with the notion of Vision which must include ALL people, leaving no one behind, and yet also hold in tension the dire forecast of the UN's IPCC panel if we do not react strongly.

II. NEXT YEAR And LONGER TERM.

We remain focused on implementing robust subcommittees, as listed above, but we need help. If you are interested in be-

ing part of this exciting endeavour, please contact one of the committee members.

Camping and Retreat Specialist

With the arrival of September comes the realization we are quickly nearing the end of our 2019 camping and retreat season. This year I was actively involved in Winter Retreat (Edmonton), Nurturing Spirit Retreat (Samish Island), Adult Reunion (Hills of Peace), Junior High / Senior High Camp (Hills of Peace), Hills of Peace Family Camp and Junior Camp (Hills of Peace). Hills of Peace Men's Retreat will be held at the end of September followed by BC Women's Retreat in Chilliwack. I am proud to be a part of these events and am pleased we are able to offer something for everyone.

Despite our successes, we still face challenges to secure enough staff to support our youth programming. Junior Camp is our most popular youth camp and, for the last two years, we have turned campers away due to inadequate staffing. As we and other faith communities struggle with low attendance at the congregational level, it is distressing to turn youth away. Participation in camp was an integral part of my youth and the youth who attend our camping programs are a key part of our future. For some, their only connection with Community of Christ is through camp.

I spend a lot of time "in my head" thinking about our camping programs and brainstorming ways to motivate adults to become involved. We are fortunate to have a small group of young adults and parents who year after year, make the commitment to be on staff at our youth camps. Some of our young adults take unpaid time off work because of their strong commitment to our programming. Despite this commitment, we cannot assume these volunteers will always be available and we need additional adults to ease the burden and fill the gap from year to year.

We have expanded our Leaders in Training (LIT) program to develop young leaders but we also need experienced leaders to mentor and assist our counsellors and LITs. This year we introduced the concept of "Wise Leaders". These were experienced staff who attended camp as support staff. They taught classes, lead activities, provided spiritual leadership, mentored and supported the counsellors during the day. This allowed the counsellors to simply focus their energy on the campers.

In December 2018, the directors for Winter Retreat and the three Hills of Peace youth camps gathered in Edmonton for a Directors Planning Retreat. The purpose was to begin planning 2019 camps and to discuss our vision for a sustainable future in our youth programming. Our day began with attendees sharing why they made a commitment to youth camps:

I want to give the kids the same experience at camp that I had, growing up to form the same bonds and life long friendships with the people you meet.

Camps made me who I am and created some of my closest relationships; it anchors my faith. I want the youth of today and tomorrow to have that same opportunity.

I have a deep desire to create a fun, bonding experience where our campers will create their own community, learn who God is and understand God loves them.

I like to see others grow and find themselves. I always had someone supporting me and cheering me on as I grew and I enjoy seeing the same in others.

Camp was a very formative experience for me as a child. I see the impact it had on me well into adulthood and I want that same thing for the next generation. I saw lots of adults gave of their time to create that space. Now it is my turn.

I implore upon you to reflect on your camp experiences and give serious consideration for your ability to become involved. Our programming is dependent upon volunteers and our youth need <u>YOU</u>. I invite you to put aside assumptions about your abilities and what we may or may not need. I will brainstorm with you to determine how your gifts can both benefit our youth and meet your personal needs.

I hope you will give our needs prayerful consideration and invite you to contact me with your ideas or willingness to say YES.

Samish Island Campground Report

Samish Island Campground and Retreat Center continues to serve well for all who visit the grounds. The place continues to look and operate fantastic thanks to our great caretaker teams. We've had pretty good responses for help for the kitchen work day in February and for the work week at the end of April. 2018 year ended in the black, but just barely due to some event cancellations and some unexpected emergency repairs.

I hope you noticed that I referred to the place as Samish Island Campground and Retreat Center instead of just Samish Island Campground. The board recommended and the three mission centers approved of the name change for social medial and marketing purposes only. The official name has not and will not change, but you will and have seen the new name on the shirts, jackets, sweatshirts, mugs that we have been selling and on the web site at campsamish.org.

The campgrounds continue to be a busy place. By the end of August there will have been 24 events so far this year with around 9 more to happen by the end of October when we shut down for the year. Of those 24 events, 11 have been Community of Christ and 13 are Non-Profit groups. The remaining events are mostly Non-Profit. The Budget for 2019 is around \$313K which is about \$8k less than last year. And at the end of last year we were only able to transfer a little over \$3K from operations to development. I hope this year will be better.

Since the last report, several things have happened around the grounds. The south side siding of the CFC was replaced with hardy board and painted. Eric Meinke of Cross Creek Construction did a fantastic job and will be back in September to clean an paint the rest of the building. Over 3K board feet of cedar lumber was harvested from fallen and dying cedar trees at the end of last year. And part of the lumber was used to put a ceiling in the Gazebo during work week along with new wiring and some recessed LED lights. This should keep the birds out and makes a very nice place for visiting, meditation, or what have you.

Also during work week three of the rustic cabins were remodeled making a total of four. Cabins A1, C1, and D1 received new electrical panels, insulation in the ceiling, wall board all around, nice paint, new windows and doors, and nice new bunk beds with nice mattresses. And although many hands were there to help with the work, I have to really thank Dick Custer for his assistance. Now retired, Dick used to work installing wallboard and doing the mudding and taping. He worked extra hours every day and stayed one day longer to get things with the wallboard finished right.

Unfortunately, one of our caretaker teams is moving on to another job. John has accepted the position of Inland West Mission Center President. He and Sandi will be greatly missed and will be a very hard act to follow. Their ministry has been so great in many areas. Now the campground board is looking for another to replace them.

There's always work that needs to be done so if you have some spare time feel free to offer some assistance. It will be greatly appreciated. But make sure you find some time to come to the campgrounds for a retreat and enjoy the rest and spiritual uplifting that so many continue to find.


