Welcome to the 2021 Canada West Mission Conference! "How can we keep from singing?"



Parliamentary Guide

Meeting Procedures At A Glance

- A main motion must be moved, seconded, and stated by the Chair before it can be discussed.
- If you approve the motion as it is, vote for it. If you disapprove the motion, in total, vote against it.
- If you approve the idea of the motion but want to change it, move to amend it by adding, deleting, or substituting.
- If you want competent advice to help you to make your decision, move to refer the motion to an appropriate person or committee with instructions to report back.
- If you feel that a person or committee can handle it better than the assembly, move to refer the motion with power to act.
- If the pending matter should be set aside temporarily because something more urgent has come up, move that it be laid on the table.
- If you want time to think the motion over, move that consideration be postponed to a certain time.
- If you think that further discussion is unnecessary, move to close debate.
- If you do not agree with a decision by the Chair, appeal the decision to the assembly.
- If you think that a matter introduced is not germane to the matter at hand, a question of order may be raised.
- If you think that too much time is being consumed by speakers, you can move a time limit on such speeches.
- If a motion has several parts and you wish to vote differently on these parts, move to divide the motion.

Delegate Selection Process

Using the Ministerial Information System (Shelby), the number of CWM delegates was calculated according to congregation book membership as of June 1, 2021. The formula is one delegate per fifteen members with a minimum of two delegates in any congregation.

Congregations select delegates by nomination and election at a congregation business meeting. Pastors may also be authorized to select or appoint delegates in a manner appropriate to circumstances. Pastors provide a list of their congregation's delegates to the Mission Centre President.

Pastors may submit additional names of persons to serve as delegates in the fourteen days before the business meeting. These names will be presented to the business meeting and will be accepted by a vote of the business meeting as amendments to the "Report of the Credentials Committee."

Similarly, persons whose names need to be withdrawn as delegates for any reason may be dealt with by a letter from the Pastor and substitutes may be named. These changes will also be dealt with as amendments to the "Report of the Credentials Committee."

Non-resident members may be represented in a business meeting in a similar ratio from each province. Delegates may be appointed by the Mission Centre President at least 2 weeks prior to the business meeting. Non-resident members can "volunteer" to serve as delegates with notice to the Mission Centre President no later than two weeks prior to the business meeting.

CWM Staff who are available to serve as delegates must be elected by their congregation or appointed by their pastor. Staff are not ex-officio delegates.

The report naming delegates is presented to the conference by the "Credentials Committee," which consists of the Mission Centre President and the Administrative Assistant for the Mission Centre.

• Conference Etiquette

- 1. Be mindful of disruptive sounds nearby as you address the conference. Find a quiet, well-lit space for you to join the conference. This will ensure delegates can clearly see and understand you.
- 2. Each user should only join on one device (unless using phone audio with video) to avoid a loud echo sound.
- 3. All users should be muted except the Chair and the individual addressing the conference. This is to ensure delegates can clearly see and understand the individual addressing the conference.
- 4. If a delegate wishes to address the conference, they should be instructed to indicate so by making it known in the chat box or by using the "raise hand" feature which will alert a moderator of their intention to address the conference.
- 5. If Internet speed is an issue, it is recommended that a user do one of two things to preserve the quality of the call:
 - a) Turn off their camera (this will ensure their audio can continue without disruption)
 - b) Join the video conference via Zoom and opting to dial-in for audio. The delegate will then dial in using their telephone, enter the meeting ID number as well as their participant ID. This will marry their video feed with the audio from their phone. With the audio signal now being carried through their telephone, the user's Internet will only need to transmit video, thus preserving the quality of their video feed.

Tech Tips

Accessibility

While Zoom does support dial-in options for those who wish to just join by audio only, this reduces overall interactivity for those doing so. As such, we recommend all delegates join via computer/smartphone/ device to ensure a similar and equitable experience for all.

As opposed to an in-person conference where someone could simply raise their hand to address the conference, an e-Conference will require more time and patience to ensure people who would like to speak or share in the chat box have enough time to do so.

Polling

Proven success has been found using the <u>PollEverywhere</u> platform. This is a paid service that allows meeting chairs to securely poll delegates in real time, easily make changes/amendments to motions. Also, results can be displayed immediately.

- ⇒Using any browser on any device connected to the Internet
- ⇒Via SMS (text message)

Proposed 2022 Budget and 2021 Budget Management

We share a Mission and a Purpose

Consistent with the Mission 2021 budget and our 2021-22 Business Plan we continue to work collaboratively and collectively to provide opportunities to gather, share and grow.

In 2020 and continuing in 2021 we have had the prolonged impact of the COVID19 Pandemic on our activities and operations. Much of the activities switched to online but in-person meetings and activities did not occur. This meant that much of our budget activity was also affected.

To provide a full year of support we propose a 2022 budget of \$384,000 as follows (with comparatives to 2021 approved budgets).

- Mission operations \$60,000 (\$50,000 in 2021)
- Mission initiatives \$74,000 (\$74,000 in 2021)
- Canadian strategies project \$24,000 (\$24,000 in 2021)
- Revitalization \$16,000 (\$16,000 in 2021)
- programs/activities/events \$210,000 (\$170,000 in 2021)
- subsidies for youth camping \$31,000 (\$31,000 in 2021)
- Total 2022 draft budget of \$384,000 (\$334,000 in 2021)

Further, we propose underwriting this sustainable budget with the following funding for a total of \$384,000.

- support for operations \$164,000 (\$224,000 in 2021)
 \$115,000 from congregational support (\$100,000 in 2021)
 \$65,000 from general contributions from Individuals (\$54,000 in 2021)
 \$10,000 from investment returns (\$10,000 in 2021)
- registration fees for programs/activities/events \$139,000 (\$139,000 in 2021),
 and
- a reserve transfer of \$55,000 (\$31,000 in 2021)
- Total 2022 budget funding \$384,000 (\$334,000 in 2021)

A copy of the full 2022 draft budget is on page three of this document.

As we continue to manage our assets and resources of investments, camps, and people we estimate we will have \$509,000 in savings or investments at the start of 2022 comprised of unrestricted reserves of approximately \$330,000 and

restricted reserves for youth, evangelism, and mission of approximately \$179,000. We recommend consolidating these restricted funds with the unrestricted funds so the Mission Conference can determine any future allocations going forward with all \$509,000 in funds available as unrestricted.

We have 2 camp boards (Samish and Hills of Peace), 12 congregations and 4 mission staff (1 paid, 1 contract and 2 volunteer), and we have a restricted minimum balance of \$228,000 under the World Church minimum balance policy. We are proposing each Campground Board receive annual CWM support of \$50,000 in 2022.

Our current financial management philosophy and principles are as follows.

- we contribute corporately and we make donations individually,
- we support and subsidize only youth who cannot pay,
- we create innovative and flexible arrangements to meet changing needs as in COVID19 and virtual gatherings,
- we work with limited resources, and we manage our funds to keep our program and administrative costs minimal, and
- we leverage technology to bridge distances and minimize costs

Our shared goal remains to be sustainable as a Mission. In 2022 and going forward we propose the following.

- we need to annually balance our budget,
- we need to reduce reliance on reserves to minimal support,
- we need to increase congregation support in 2022 and potentially more in the future,
- we need to increase individual contributions to be able to continue programs which both meet needs and cover cost
- we need to continue to price registration fees for programs, activities, and events to cover the costs, and
- we need to seek alternative funding likely in the form of grants or alternate revenues.

Therefore, we recommend approval for a 2022 Mission budget of \$384,000. We also recommend consolidation of restricted funds with the unrestricted funds, so we have future planning flexibility.

Mission Centre President Annual Report

Greetings to the 2021 Canada West Mission Conference.

I am going to avoid my tradition of thanking each individual staff person and volunteer by name for their contributions to the work of the mission centre. Each of them have provided their own reports for this program and I commend them to you. I thank each of them for their significant efforts to maintain our programs and services in the face of the constraints on our normal activities due to the COVID19 pandemic.

I also commend the reports from each of the congregations. They represent the place where "the tire hits the road" of local church initiatives. Each one has done the best they can this past year, also while contending with pandemic restrictions. Well done!

There are a few individuals who have not directly written reports this year, but who I believe need to be recognized by the conference. The few lines that will follow each person's name are admittedly insufficient to describe their work and contributions.

Parker Johnson: Parker completed a five-year contractual assignment with the mission centre in March 2021. He was assigned as a Youth and Young Adult Specialist to the Calgary congregation. His local efforts and success in Calgary were accompanied by contributions to the success of various youth and young adult activities at the mission centre level. He was active with the Pastor and other leaders in the Calgary congregation's efforts to define and ultimately obtain a new physical church home. In the last couple of years of his assignment, Parker also accepted a coordinating role for communications for the church across Canada. He contributed to the online presence of the Canadian mission centres and congregations through a completely re-designed website as well as initiating and leading social media involvement. Please join me in thanking Parker for his ministry, leadership, creativity, and many contributions to the Canada West Mission Centre and the Calgary Congregation in the last five years.

Gary McDonald: There is no report from the Meadow Ridge Congregation this year because earlier this year they completed the sale of their property and wound down the operations of the congregation. Gary accepted appointment as Pastor of the congregation two years ago with the specific objective of leading the members through this very difficult phase of their congregational life. Gary and Helene were warmly welcomed by the congregation and, by all accounts, it was a mutually enjoyable experience, despite achieving the objective of the congregation no longer being active. Thank you to Gary for taking on this important leadership task and performing it with skill and good humour. I also wish to thank all the former members and past leaders of the Meadow Ridge Congregation for their nearly 40 years of service to the community. A closing service was held online in February which attracted participation and attendance from people touched by the congregation across Canada West Mission as well as many from across Canada and south of the U.S. border. Well done!

Anita Bates: Anita has been our Mission Centre Historian for the last eleven years. Anita took her responsibility very seriously and did her best to have Historians formally appointed in all congregations. She established a positive and mutually respectful relationship with the Office of the Church Historian and the Church Archivist. Unfortunately, Anita has been suffering from poor health over the past year or so and determined she needed to resign from this responsibility this year. Her last report to the Church Archivist was nearly 40 pages in length. It was complete and comprehensive in its coverage of the Canada West Mission Centre activities in 2020. Recognizing her health constraints, I relieved Anita of writing one more report for this conference and asked Lisa Neudorf to pull some significant details from Anita's 40-page report.

That is what is provided for you. I need to share this brief anecdote that is a true credit to Anita. In response to Anita's last report, Rachel Killebrew, the Church Archivist, wrote: "Thank you so much for getting this wonderful and detailed report to our archives. You always do such a beautiful job. The CWM produces some of the best and most consistent reports that come in each year. You are a true blessing to our future generations." The Canada West Mission Centre thanks Anita for her years of dedicated service as our Historian.



God calls us to discern the potential in the unexpected and to do something wonderful with it!" My prayer is we may remember and accept this challenge as we create whatever our "new normal" will be in our congregations and in our mission centre.

Creating Connection Director Report

As you'll recall from my Mission Conference 2020 report, I moved all my Creating Connection events online because of the pandemic. Since that report, I'm happy to share our attendance has increased in every group and attracted people from across Canada and the US and occasionally from England, France, Serbia, China, Japan, Africa, Australia and more.

Coffee and Meaningful Conversation Online Every Thursday from 10:30 – 12:00 pm. In this group we are all given the opportunity to share our thoughts on the topic without interruption, given time to think and form thoughts. For those of us listening, it's our opportunity to practice active listening. Our sole job is to listen and understand, without having the burden of planning a response or question. Since June of 2020 we have had an average of 11 RSVPs per meetup, 7 attendees, 2 first timers and an average of 6 per meetup are not Community of Christ members.

An Afternoon of Nurturing Spirit Online Every Wednesday from 3-4:30 pm. In these 90-minute sessions I bring in guests to speak about a wide variety of modalities and topics. Our format:

- Welcome and Introduction of Creating Connection and our mission
- 5-minute welcoming meditation
- Guest speaker presentation or talk followed by Questions & Answers
- Next week's guest shares an overview of their upcoming session
- I share upcoming events in the Creating Connection program
- 5-minute closing meditation

In May and June of 2021, I ran a 6-week mentoring program with two of our Afternoon of Nurturing Spirit guests who have now become co-hosts with me. We have another member of the team, who was a guest and now contributes meditations once a month. Since June of 2020 we have had an average of 19 RSVPs per meetup, 15 attendees, 3 first timers and 13 were not Community of Christ members.

Satsang: Singing into Silence Online Monthly on Saturday. In this group my role is to oversee the monthly events, manage tech, promote, edit, and post the information. Doug and Vickie MacArthur (Lethbridge), play various instruments, lead songs and chants, and book special musical guests. We sing along at home while muted. Since November of 2020 we have had an average of 38 RSVPs per Satsang, 26 attendees, 5 first timers and of the 26 attendees 19 were not Community of Christ members.

Book Club Online Third Monday of every second month. This is a casual discussion of books from a wide range of genres. Kelly Duff - Victoria, leads with thought provoking questions about the characters, the story, it's meaning and our interpretations. My role is to assist Kelly and be a mentor. Since October of 2020 we have had an average of 6 RSVPs per Book Club, 4 attendees, 2 first timers and of the 4 attendees 2 were not Community of Christ members.

ESL Coffee and Conversation in-person Every Saturday from 10-11:30am. Our newest group started in July and is led by Nevena Golijan. This is our first event that is in-person since the pandemic hit. Nevena guides the conversation for those wanting to practice their English conversation skills. My role is to advertise the meetup, mentor, and offer assistance.

The workshop will include background on Creating Connection and our mission, explanation of our advertising platform 'meetup', how to be a good facilitator, a hands-on practice facilitating our own topics, sharing our meaningful stories, and Q&A time.

Canadian Peace / Justice Committee June 2021 Report

The Committee was formed in April, 2007, primarily to support local congregations in our attempts to be "... dedicated to the pursuit of peace." Activities were again hampered because: (a) the Chair's time was spent on the Climate Change subcommittee; and (b) we feel we have hit the limit of available volunteer time for subcommittees.

I. ACTIONS THIS YEAR.

- A. **Created a Climate Change Crisis Subcommittee.** Our primary efforts have been to create and feed into The North American Climate Justice Team. Originally intended to create an October 2020 Colloquy, the team had to pivot and now has an ongoing webinar series which includes world-class scientists and others with a deep and wide background on key topics.
- B. **Create Social Media Resources.** We have created a Facebook Page and will continue to experiment with its possibilities. Thanks, Sariah and Betty! We also want to create podcasts and webcasts, to expand our reach.
- C. **Maintained Our Current Projects and Our Peace / Justice Website.** While not an emphasis this year we have continued support for such endeavours as:
- a. **Indigenous Relations**: We have some key resources, thanks to the address by Barb Oldale at the CWM 2017 Mission Conference and Tracy Smith. This is only a start contact us if interested in helping with reconciliation. It has been updated due to the recent discovery of unmarked graves at residential schools.
- b. **Resources to Develop Healthy Relations with our Muslim Community:** This is centered on a hopeful, nonviolent strategy of trying to strengthen the reasonable voices within our own community, within the Muslim community and among society in general. It includes the opportunity for congregations to engage with their local Muslim community and has been updated due to recent events.
- c. Buying Fair Trade coffee where possible, which supports the "Abolish Poverty" initiative.
- d. **Expanding the church's Canadian Peace / Justice website**. This is still fairly skeletal. If you see an unfilled area where you would like to help we would love to hear from you!

Phase II - Subcommittees.

In 2014 we transitioned to the second phase – creating **subcommittees** - to raise up and provide resources for those Canadian-specific issues which call us via recent inspired counsel to courageously challenge and help transform societal trends which diminish God's creation. Further topics include:

Mental Health & Eliminating Stigma Human Trafficking close to your Church;

Justice: Restorative not Punitive; Eco. Concerns: Water, GMOs, etc.

Foreign Aid, no strings attached; etc; Child Poverty; . . . Others?

Inter-religious Relations;

<u>Note</u>: We have recognized this phase has stretched our ability to tap into the available volunteer capacity of our Field and thus each year we will focus simply on one or two topics.

II. <u>NEXT YEAR And LONGER TERM.</u>

We remain focused on implementing robust **subcommittees**, as listed above, **but we need help**. If you are interested in being part of this exciting endeavour, please contact one of the committee members.

Samish Island Campground Report

In 1958, as a nine year old, I was well aware that the church in the Northwest would be selling their beloved campground property on Silver Lake in Snohomish County and developing a new campground at Samish Island, far away from our home in Tacoma, Washington. Now, 63 years later when I assumed the president's role, I thought I knew most everything about the camp. Truth is, I've learned much more about its past, what is today, and how we are on a journey together into the future of the camp.

Since your last report from my predecessor Jim Fish, there probably has been very little physical change to the campgrounds which would meet the eye. Dangerous and diseased trees along the dining hall driveway have been removed, cut, split and stacked as firewood, and a large fir tree was removed across from the east caretaker's residence. Close examination will show there are about 400 seedling trees planted throughout the grounds but most noticeably along Scott Road. There is also a new commercial grade clothes washer in the dining hall for cleaning the kitchen linens. Otherwise, the camp looks much the same as it did when it was closed for the pandemic in March, 2020.

What isn't so obvious to the eye are the concerted efforts made by our camp and food service managers to reduce or eliminate utility expenses and stifle the outflow of our cash accounts. Sadly, since March, 2020 to date, we have transferred almost \$186,000 USD to our operating accounts to pay utilities, salaries, insurance and provide for general maintenance. The good news is we have received income from our Taylor shellfish agreement, the US Government small business loans and grants, offerings from individuals and congregations and the wonderful "Through the Eyes of Samish" virtual fundraising event. That single talent event netted nearly \$62,500 USD for camp operations. Many thanks to Julie and Alexis Beer and the many talented, generous and dedicated people who organized and produced that wonderful program. It certainly brought out the best in so many people who love and are concerned about supporting and enjoying the Samish Island camp. My thanks to everyone who worked on the event and those who generously donated money, time and talents to that cause.

Our current Development fund stands at \$245,000 of which \$78,300 are designated funds for specific capital projects. Our operations balance is \$3,500.

Volunteer work on the campground has been minimal due to the restrictions of social distancing and cautions taken by people who would usually be on the grounds and volunteer. The closure of the US-Canada border has prohibited the travel to the camp by our willing and hard working Canadian Saints who would otherwise be coming to the camp to lend their skills and talents to the many tasks which await us. This should all change soon as many travel and gathering restrictions have been lifted and travel should become much easier. Just in July, the World Church has given permission for the camp to reopen (with some health and gathering restrictions) and there was a one day work session held on Saturday, July 24th. There is an Intergenerational Retreat for the Greater Pacific Northwest Mission Center to be held July 29-August 1st. Other events are being scheduled by the church and other groups who are friends of the church and have been users of the camp for many years past. We welcome these other groups and their fees certainly supplement our income stream and strengthen our financial position.

In our near future, we plan to continue to be good stewards of the land and buildings. We are also doing what we can to maintain and repair our machinery and power equipment so as to extend their lives and make it available for quality work by our paid staff as well as by volunteers so their time can be maximized when they go to camp to work on projects and tasks.

Projects on our near future "RADAR" are the replacement of the deteriorating dining hall doors, remodeling the rustic cabins and the construction of a shop and storage building for tractors, tools and equipment as well as an indoor workshop.

Most importantly, as we look ahead, we will continue to strive to make Samish Island camp a place where people meet and interact with God as well as develop and restore relationships with family, friends and fellow disciples of Christ. Life can be practiced there in a spirit of wholesome living and community under the influence of the beauty of God's creation and constant love. I look forward to doing my best to provide leadership and continuing to serving you, the camp staff and all who enjoy the camping experience at Samish Island.

We have also renovated a couple more cabins on site, with new roofing, siding, windows, and doors. It will be quite a new experience even for the long-time campers at Hills of Peace when we do return.

There are always a few issues at camp caused by weather or trees falling. This year there was a burst pipe in one of the houses but our diligent caretaker, Courtney Znak, had the situation under control and was able to quickly get the proper companies out to aid in the cleanup process. Courtney has done an amazing job at ensuring our grounds are well taken care of and has been a huge help in the completion of the Craft Shack project as well. Courtney, thank you for your continued hard work and dedication to these grounds, I know we all appreciate it. None of what goes on at camp would be possible without you, both in our on-season and off-season.

I am very much looking forward to next year when we can all (hopefully) get together again and enjoy Hills of Peace in person. In the meantime, thank you for all your continued support and generosity; it does not go unnoticed. Please remember to take care of each other, be safe, and have a wonderful year. See you soon.


