Parliamentary Guide

Meeting Procedures At A Glance

- A main motion must be moved, seconded, and stated by the Chair before it can be discussed.
- If you approve the motion as it is, vote for it. If you disapprove the motion, in total, vote against it.
- If you approve the idea of the motion but want to change it, move to amend it by adding, deleting, or substituting.
- If you want competent advice to help you to make your decision, move to refer the motion to an appropriate person or committee with instructions to report back.
- If you feel that a person or committee can handle it better than the assembly, move to refer the motion with power to act.
- If the pending matter should be set aside temporarily because something more urgent has come up, move that it be laid on the table.
- If you want time to think the motion over, move that consideration be postponed to a certain time.
- If you think that further discussion is unnecessary, move to close debate.
- If you do not agree with a decision by the Chair, appeal the decision to the assembly.
- If you think that a matter introduced is not germane to the matter at hand, a question of order may be raised.
- If you think that too much time is being consumed by speakers, you can move a time limit on such speeches.
- If a motion has several parts and you wish to vote differently on these parts, move to divide the motion.

- **Conference Etiquette**

1. Be mindful of disruptive sounds nearby as you address the conference. Find a quiet, well-lit space for you to join the conference. This will ensure delegates can clearly see and understand you.
2. Each user should only join on one device (unless using phone audio with video) to avoid a loud echo sound.
3. All users should be muted except the Chair and the individual addressing the conference. This is to ensure delegates can clearly see and understand the individual addressing the conference.
4. If a delegate wishes to address the conference, they should be instructed to indicate so by making it known in the chat box or by using the “raise hand” feature which will alert a moderator of their intention to address the conference.
5. If Internet speed is an issue, it is recommended that a user do one of two things to preserve the quality of the call:
 - a) Turn off their camera (this will ensure their audio can continue without disruption)
 - b) Join the video conference via Zoom and opting to dial-in for audio.

The delegate will then dial in using their telephone, enter the meeting ID number as well as their participant ID. This will marry their video feed with the audio from their phone. With the audio signal now being carried through their telephone, the user’s Internet will only need to transmit video, thus preserving the quality of their video feed.

- **Accessibility**

While Zoom does support dial-in options for those who wish to just join by audio only, this reduces overall interactivity for those doing so. As such, we recommend all delegates join via computer/smartphone/device to ensure a similar and equitable experience for all.

As opposed to an in-person conference where someone could simply raise their hand to address the conference, an e-Conference will require more time and patience to ensure people who would like to speak or share in the chat box have enough time to do so.

Proposed 2024 Budget

Our call as members and friends of the Canada West Mission Centre is to remain faithful to the Mission of Christ.

Consistent with the Mission Centre's 2024 budget, we continue to work towards events and missional activities that are relevant, genuine, and give opportunities to gather for visiting, fun, and meaningful worship.

We recognize that it will take time and a lot of hard work by our leadership teams, our camping directors, and staff to increase the attendance for our camps and reunions. Our Family Reunions are showing signs of recovery, but our youth camping programs are still struggling as we try to encourage youth who have missed two years of the camping experience to return.

To provide for the basic needs of the mission centre in the coming year without creating hardship on our faith full contributors we have made the following budget adjustment:

- Mission Programs have been reduced from \$169,000 to \$42,500 – in the past we had provided our campgrounds with a programming advance to help them maintain the grounds during COVID.
- Shared Mission – in the past this initiative helped fund the mission centre's camping director position – should we see that a camping director is required for 2024 it would be funded out of the contract services budget line
- A number of operational budget line items have been reduced to reflect the use of technology as well as having more volunteer support.

To support the 2024 missional activities, we are still looking for generous support from our members and congregations.

- We have reduced the mission centre's income requests for both the member contributors and our congregation by \$75,000.
- We have reduced the transfers of funds from our investment reserves to cover operational expenses.

- Continue to look for ways to reduce the day-to-day expenses that do not directly support the mission of the church.
- Apply the surplus funds from the 2023 budget to the planned 2024 activities with the hope that it encourages our members to re-engage in ways to support their congregations, the family and youth camps, and the mission centre.

Our current financial management philosophy and principles are as follows.

- we contribute corporately through congregations, and we make donations individually,
- we support and subsidize only youth who cannot pay,
- we continue to create innovative and flexible arrangements to meet changing needs as in COVID19 and virtual gatherings, but are moving to restart in person activities and gatherings,
- we work with limited resources, and we manage our funds to keep our program and administrative costs minimal, and
- we leverage technology to bridge distances and minimize costs Our shared goal remains to be sustainable as a Mission. In 2024 and going forward we propose the following.
- we need to annually balance our budget,
- we need to reduce reliance on reserves to minimal support,
- we need to increase congregation support in 2024 and potentially more in the future,
- we need to increase individual contributions to be able to continue programs which both meet needs and cover costs.
- we need to continue to price registration fees for programs, activities, and events to cover the costs (2024 is proposed to be 65% cost recovery), and
- we need to seek alternative funding – likely in the form of grants or alternate revenues.

Therefore, we recommend approval for a 2024 Mission budget of \$226,000.

Mission Centre President Team Report

It has been a very full year! In taking a moment to review the past year the standout moments have been those where we gathered in person to spend time together. Whether it be traveling to our hybrid conference sites or visiting our campgrounds, being together is sacred time.

In January we held a special conference to elect our delegates for Community of Christ World Conference, and Kat provided a half day virtual pastors' retreat. In February the three of us participated in a lovely Nurturing Spirit Creating Connection retreat just outside Chilliwack. In March we had an in-person staff retreat with our Mission Centre President team, Debra, and Sandra, in Langley. We enjoyed spiritual nourishment from Denise Esch, shared meals, and talked about our hopes and dreams for the Mission Centre.

In April we travelled to Independence Missouri for Community of Christ World Conference where we got inspired by seeing so many wonderful people from our Mission Centre (big thanks to those who made the pilgrimage there and volunteered their time to be delegates). We were reinvigorated by the energy and shared challenges of members from around the world, and met up with the women who are the volunteer Mission Centre President team in Canada East.

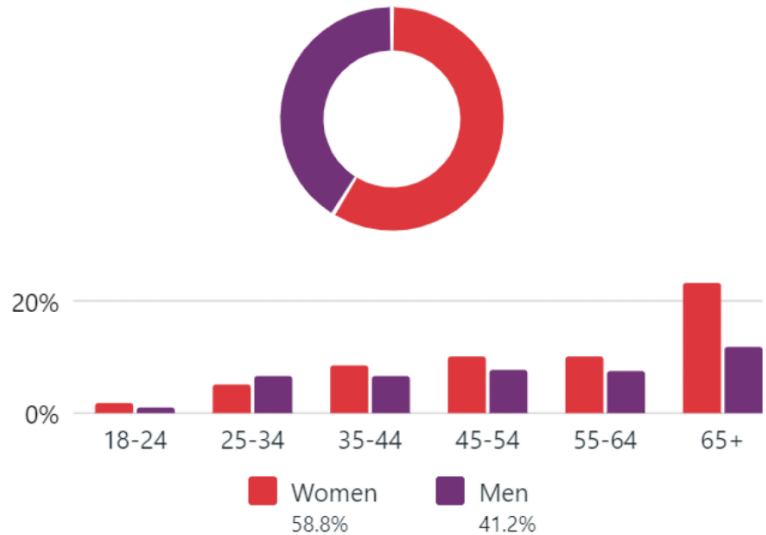

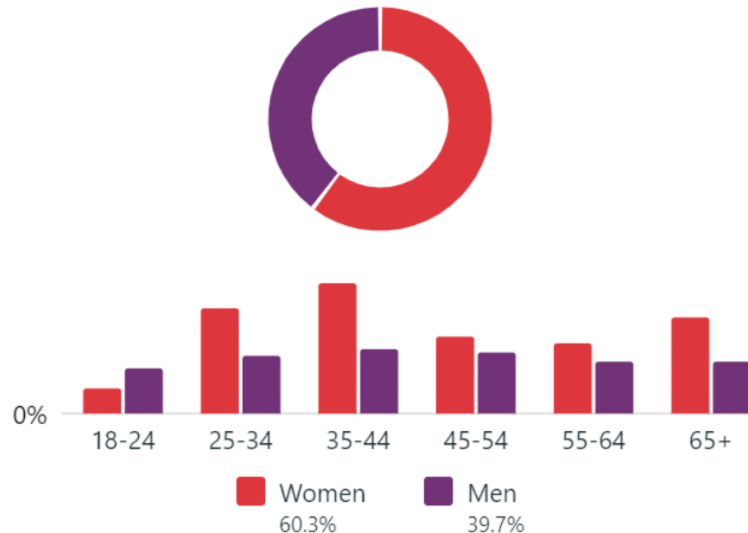

Canada West Mission Historian Report

In the months before the 2023 Community of Christ World Conference, I had the opportunity to go through some long-standing records of the Canada West Mission Centre. The objective of this work was to identify records that could be deposited with the Community of Christ Archives at the Independence Temple – and, therefore, be removed from the records to be retained in the mission centre (and other records that could be destroyed).

This process allowed me to review records and documents that went back to the 1960s and even earlier. For the information of the conference and the mission centre, here is a highly summarized list of the records that are now on file with the church Archives:

- Records from the three districts that became the Canada West Mission Centre in 2004: Saskatchewan District, Alberta District, and British Columbia District. Records included (but were not limited to):
 - ◇ Annual business meeting minutes from as early as the 1960s
 - ◇ Quite often corresponding Financial Statements for the same years
 - ◇ Non-Resident Pastors Reports
- Similar records from the former Northern Plains and Prairie Provinces Region – generally records specific to Saskatchewan and Alberta
- Records of the work of the “Canadian National Church Task Force” that was active from 1998 to 2002 – just prior to establishment of the two Canadian mission centres
- Records (usually business meeting minutes and financial information) from congregations, missions, and small groups which have closed including:
 - ◇ Porcupine Plain and Arborfield, Saskatchewan (2 separate congregations, but closely connected over the years)
 - ◇ Weyburn, SK
 - ◇ Moose Jaw, SK
 - ◇ Crammond, AB
 - ◇ Lloydminster, AB
 - ◇ Red Deer, AB

Included in the mission centre records retained locally is a comparatively complete set of newsletters from Saskatchewan (and, later, Alberta) District from the 1960s to the early 2000s. There are also congregational Historian reports for many congregations. The reports vary in how regularly they were produced and how far back in time they go and how recently they have continued. These records are “gold mines” for anyone doing any kind of historical research on the church in Western Canada. I have retained these records here for now as I will use them as source material for my (hopefully!) monthly “Historians Corner” in the Weekly Wire. Watch for it!

And with that comes the annual encouragement for ALL congregations in Canada West to appoint a Historian. We currently have Historians appointed in six of our eleven congregations. It would be great to be able to report a full slate of Historians next year!

Here is the motivation (if you need any): Unless the descriptions of significant events in the life of a congregation (or campground, or mission centre) are written down shortly after they occur, details are forgotten, and accuracy is diminished. At some point the very memory of an event is lost. Please help ensure that the history of your congregation is not forgotten!

Feel free to contact me for further information about the role of a congregational Historian.

Canadian Peace / Justice Committee - June 2023 Report

The Committee was formed in April, 2007, primarily to support local congregations in our attempts to be “. . . dedicated to the pursuit of peace.” Activities were again hampered because: (a) the Chair’s time was spent on the Climate Change subcommittee; and (b) we feel we have hit the limit of available volunteer time for subcommittees. That said, we do hope to reinvigorate efforts somewhat this year.

I. ACTIONS THIS YEAR.

A. Continued our Climate Change Crisis Subcommittee.

Our primary efforts have been to feed into The North American Climate Justice Team. Originally intended to create an Oct. 2020 Colloquy, the team had to pivot and now has an ongoing webinar series that includes world-class scientists and others with a deep and wide background on key topics.

B. Create Social Media Resources.

We have created a Facebook Page and will continue to experiment with its possibilities. Thanks, Sariah and Betty! We also want to create podcasts and webcasts, to expand our reach.

C. Maintained Our Current Projects and Our Peace / Justice Website.

While not an emphasis this year we have continued support for such endeavours as:

a. **Indigenous Relations:** We have some key resources, thanks to Barb Oldale’s address at the CWM 2017 Mission Conference, and also Tracy Smith. This is only a start – contact us if interested in helping. It has been updated for the recent discovery of child & unmarked graves.

b. **Resources to Develop Healthy Relations with our Muslim Community:** This is centered on a hopeful, nonviolent strategy of trying to strengthen the reasonable voices within our own community, within the Muslim community and among society in general. It includes the opportunity for congregations to engage with their local Muslim community, & has been updated due to recent events.

c. **Buying Fair Trade** coffee where possible, which supports the “Abolish Poverty” initiative;

d. **Expanding the church’s Canadian Peace / Justice website.** We added a statement on the war in Ukraine. Overall, while our website is still fairly skeletal, if you see an unfilled area where you would like to help - we would love to hear from you!

D. Phase II - Subcommittees.

In 2014 we transitioned to the 2nd phase – creating subcommittees - to raise up and provide resources for those Canadian-specific issues that call us via recent inspired counsel to courageously challenge and help transform societal trends that diminish God’s creation. Further topics include the following. If interested in any topic, please contact a committee member: Mental Health & Eliminating Stigma; Justice: Restorative not Punitive; Foreign Aid, no strings attached; Inter-religious Relations; Human Trafficking close to your Church; Eco. Concerns: Water, GMOs, etc.; Child Poverty; Others?

Samish Island Campground Report

Greetings!

2023 has been a year of continual recovery from the COVID 19 pandemic. Camp activity and bookings for the camp continue to increase. To date, there have been in excess of 2,100 camper days at the camp with 36 retreats or week long camping events on the calendar. Our largest challenge for this past year has been to continue to raise income and that challenge will be reflected when we share the treasurer's report.

The second largest challenge is the continued need for maintenance and grooming the 88 acres owned by the camp with the mowing and edging the approximate 15 acres of grass, and the overall maintenance of the 68 buildings and structures we have on the campgrounds.

Our third challenge is to cope with the rising prices of food and related consumable supplies. Along with that, we have a serious need to recruit and secure cooks for all activities at the camp.

In spite of those challenges, the camp staff, volunteers and paid contractors have accomplished some notable tasks to repair and update the camp and its facilities. Four more rustic cabins have been remodeled bringing the total of completed cabins to 16. That means we only have 31 more cabins to complete. The remodels include increased insulation covered with painted 5/8" drywall, more and updated electrical outlets, new light fixtures and clothes hanging racks, new larger vinyl windows for increased ventilation, a new door and new bedroom type furniture. The two dormitory cabins in the C and D rows have had the sprinkler systems repaired from the big freeze in the winter of 2022 and are now back in service.

We have two new attractive and functional dining hall doors installed in the entry alcoves.

One large capital job that was completed last autumn was the repair of the east driveway (road) down to the lower campground. In addition to restoring the road, drainage systems were put in place for both driveways carrying the ground water away from the roads and running it into the lake or in the case of the west road off into the wetlands adjoining the backwater slough. The spoil from the two trenches was used to build up and level sunken ground at the west end of Lake Freestad which had been difficult to mow and drive across.

The camp hosted the annual work week on the first week in May. It was kind of a partial week and the attendance was a somewhat what disappointing. For those who were here, we are thankful for their dedication and hard work but was probably poorly attended being the week immediately following World Conference in Independence, Missouri.

We had a very large repair to the lake dike road on the Samish Bay side. The water from the King Tide washed part of dike and the road away.

This provides and excellent ^{segue} ~~Segue~~ to some discussion of future stewardship of our campground and Samish Island in general. In April, the World Church Conferenced passed WCR 1325, The resolution on the Climate Emergency. This past winter we began to experience the effects of climate change with the King Tide and damage to our lake and bayside dike. There was considerable flooding on Blue Heron Road to homes and cabins and the road was under several feet of water. Our campground fields on the lower campground were flooded and underwater. Furthermore, the Samish Island road which is the only access to the island was under water and access and egress to and from the island was cut off for some time and later very restricted. I don't need to tell you the negative effect flooding could have on our ability to come and go to the camp. The impact of a flooded road would be huge. Let me say this; the climate emergency is here and now. The camp staff, your board of directors and all of us together need to heed the four resolves of WCR 1325 and begin to formulate our own plans of action to do our part for the stewardship of the camp property and our fragile planet as well.

I deeply and sincerely thank the many people who have volunteered during the last 12 months and many who continue to give untold time to the camp both here on the grounds and away from the camp. This also applies to your board members and officers for their time and dedication.

Looking ahead we have several plans and ideas that are being considered for the camp. Work continues to plan our new tractor shop and maintenance building which will be constructed near the CFC and sports court. That location is called out on the camp master plan.

In the spirit of the climate resolution, we are investigating the feasibility and practicality of installing electric vehicle charging stations on the campground.

We are also giving consideration to building a fifth E Cabin with four units, each having their own private bathroom facilities as well as some desk and work space for our visiting guest ministry as well as those VIP persons who are brought in for our other nonprofit camp users.

Some dining hall remodeling and changes are also under consideration.

Looking to the future, we have the continued challenge to raise funds for cost effective camp operations and maintaining the quality of food service everyone enjoys here at the camp.

We hope to return to a profitable posture so that we can fund our development accounts and continue to grow and improve the facilities which make the camp comfortable and functional. Your continued support of donations and gifts to the camp are essential to this desired growth. We also pledge our best to provide sound and effective management by us, your board and our camp staff.

It is my hope as well as my commitment to doing all that is possible to continue to make Samish Island Camp a sacred place where we can experience God and each other in beauty, safety and religious fellowship.

Since our report last year, our group has been active and trying to fulfill Christ's Mission. This report is in a rather random order as I remember and check things to report.

For each donation, the guests received a small angel for themselves to remind them of the experience.

Coffee Morning and Games on Wednesday mornings continue to be popular. We have had potlucks, movies and desserts or ice cream nights. Our Corn Roast in August was a highlight of the summer and had a large group out. These give us the opportunity to invite friends and family who usually don't attend, allowing them to be comfortable in our building.

We held our traditional Christmas Eve service by zoom and in person for anyone wanting to attend.

We have ventured out into our community by renting our space to 2 quilt guilds for meetings and classes and have also supported 2 Hospital Auxiliary groups to meet quarterly. We are looking at a couple more rental options to help keep our building busy.

Craft nights run in the fall, winter and spring. Our group of ladies, and sometimes men, offers an evening out to visit and craft. People are welcome to bring their own projects and work on them. We have everything from scrapbooking, knitting crocheting and doing paperwork for work and more. Last year we knit about 350 toques for the homeless that went to Chilliwack Community Policing, Ann Davis Transition House for abused women, and Cyrus Centre a temporary home for displaced youth. This year we are knitting and collecting hats and mitts for this project.

The New Year of 2023 started with a Sunday service. It was a wonderful way to think about what we wanted to happen in the new year and our goals for what we wanted to accomplish.'

In June we were hosts to Beyond the Walls and were able to participate in the first in person/on zoom service. It was a wonderful weekend visiting, and hosting John, Michael and Leandro. We learned a lot about running zoom meetings, which has improved the sound of our service that we host online. We rounded the weekend off with a pot-luck lunch be for having to take them to the Abbotsford airport to fly home.

Our congregation was saddened by the passing of Marlene Campbell this year, and welcomed and enjoyed the company of Ralph and Sharon as they joined our group this year.

Maybe we stay so young because of our beautiful faith family, or it might be due to our keeping so busy; yet likely what keeps us vibrant and moving forward is God, our Heavenly Father, the Man Upstairs, Yahuah, whatever you'd like to call our Creator.

It seems like we could have submitted almost the identical report as last year, so this might seem familiar as you read it. For a change, we've written our account of the past year in a no-particular-order point-form list.

- Virtual Visiting – Pastor Darleene Skinner and Josie Buck both attended this CWM offering.

- We had one high school graduate this year—Landon Olson. We were so proud of Landon, as (due to his academic achievements) he was chosen as the Class Speaker for his graduation.

- Kathy Watson started teaching Sunday School last fall, after we had to cease holding that during the time of COVID.

- We have an anonymous donor who gives funds for youth programs in our congregation. This past Christmas we used some of the yearly donation to purchase gifts for every child and youth who attended during the year. We had 17 kids to buy for in 2022. Thus far in 2023, we already have 21.

- Each year we collect for Honduras through our Loonies 4 Literacy and Change 4 Change offerings. Added to those funds was a personal donation, as well as the proceeds from summer bottle collection at a nearby Provincial Park where three of our church family work as the Maintenance Department (they have been granted permission to use the funds from the recyclables for Honduras). With those funds there were 1,300 school sets purchased for Honduran students. Each set included a notebook, an eraser, a pen, and a pencil.



- The folks at the Ribstone Congregation are known for their generosity. We have yearly collections that support and assist the less fortunate in our area through the following collections: Mitten Tree, White Gifts, Interval Home, and Food Bank.

- Once or twice monthly, Pastor Darleene submits a “Pastor’s Pen” column to The Provost News, as part of the ecumenical rotation.

- Each of the school months, Pastor Leila submits a page from our congregation to the Chauvin Community Newsletter.

- Each month we send out a newsletter to members and friends, both near and far away.

- As happens every year, we’ve had a few Sundays when we’ve had to cancel our service, due to ill health of members or due to poor weather. Mostly weather. Blizzards and freezing rain.

-In place of a fall supper (which ran for many decades until 2019), we now hold a special offering. We are grateful for the generosity of our faith family.

The agenda will include a review of the past year’s highlight activities, election of three new board members, and a presentation of 2022 financial statements and a current financial update.

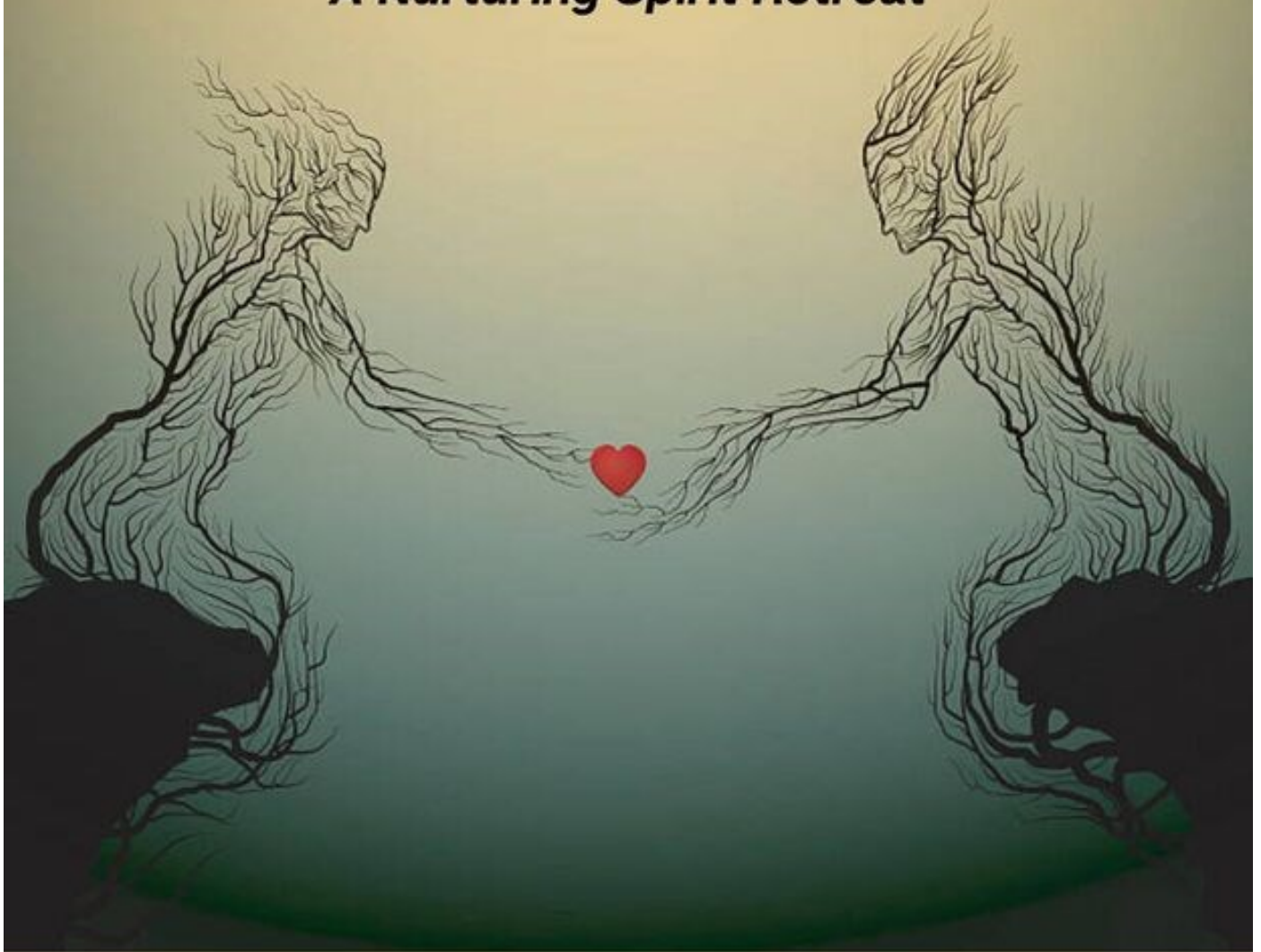
